Ancestors of William T White (1837-1852)

First Generation

1. **William Taylor¹ White** (William Ayres², Levin (of Sol)³, Solomon⁴, Simcock⁵, William⁶, William⁷), son of William Ayres White and Margaret 'Peggy' Crowson, was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1837.² William died 24 Jan 1852 in Washington, DC, at 14 years of age.³ His obituary in 1852 in the National Intelligencer and in the Religious Herald shows him as William Taylor White, age 17, who died at Columbian College on 24 Jan 1852. He was listed as a resident of Accomack County, VA. Fellow students placed a note in the National Intelligencer on 28 Jan 1852 indicating their sadness at his death and letting his friends know that people were there with him at his death. There was no mention of family in this letter.

William was named in his father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ He was shown as a son William in the will of William A. White.

William was named as an heir 30 Dec 1849 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ It was on this date that Anne C. Taylor named William T. White in her will and gave him \$1,300 & the interest thereon & so much of the principal as his guardian, Lewis D. Drummond, may consider necessary to be applied to his maintenance & education until he arrives to age 21 & then whatever amount may remain unexpended, provided he shall be studious & shall not be dissipated & at age 21 another \$300, but if he dies before age 21, then to my niece Peggy J. Nottingham.

William was listed with another family in the cenus of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ He was shown as William T. White, age 13 in HH#16 headed by Ann C. Taylor, a 55 year old farmer.

On 30 Dec 1850 when Anne C. Taylor's will was probated, Lewis D. Drummond was named guardian of William T. White, orphan of William A. White. The document read: Lewis D. Drummond and Jno. R. Drummond are bound unto the Commonwealth of Virginia, in the sum of \$3,000 ... The above Lewis D. Drummond shall pay to William T. White orphan of William A. White deceased, all such estate due the orphan as soon as he shall attain lawful age and to keep harmless W.P. Moore Senr, Geo: S. Rogers, W.P. Moore Jr and James M. Savage Gentlemen Justices of the Court now sitting. Signed in the presence of J.W. Gillet by Louis D. Drummond and John R. Drummond. (Accomack Co, VA Orphan Bonds, 31 Jul 1843 - 23 Feb 1852, pages not numbered)

Second Generation

2. **William Ayres**² **White** (Levin (of Sol)³, Solomon⁴, Simcock⁵, William⁶, William⁷) was born in Accomack Co, VA 1784-1790.¹ In 1800 the census puts his birth at 1784-1790, in 1810 at 1784-1794, in 1820 at 1775-1794, in 1830 at 1790-1800, and in 1840 at 1780-1790. The 1830 seems to be out of line with the others by 10 years, and except for this, his birth would be circa 1784-1790. William died by 26 Jun 1843 in Accomack Co, VA, at 58 years of age.² It was on this date that his will was probated. Levi Dix, John D. Parks & George White Jr. were the securities.

He married twice. He married **Demariah Dix** 27 Apr 1814 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.³ George Marshall was the security on the M.L.B. of William A. White and Demoriah Dix.

Demariah was born circa 1795 in Accomack Co, VA. Demariah ⁴ was the daughter of John Dix and Rose (----). Demariah died by 19 Dec 1821 at 26 years of age.⁵ He married **Margaret 'Peggy' Crowson** 19 Dec 1821 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ Levin Crowson was the security on the M.L.B. of William A. White (widower) and Margaret Crowson of Levin.

Margaret was born circa 1800 in Accomack Co, VA. Margaret ⁷ was the daughter of Levin (366A) Crowson and Amey Turnall. Margaret died by 29 Apr 1839 at 38 years of age. ⁸ Margaret was named in her grandmother's will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA. ⁹ She was shown as a granddaughter Peggy Crowson, daughter of Levin Crowson, in the will of Susannah Turnall.

Margaret was named as an heir 31 Jan 1831 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ It was on this date that Margaret White, wife of William A. White, formerly Margaret Crowson, was named as one of the heirs of James Powell dec'd. (Accomack Co, VA Deed Book 25, 1830-32, p. 68)

William was listed with his mother in the census of 1800 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ In 1800 he would have been one of the males, age 10-16 (bc 1784-1790) in the household headed by Sally White (Levin).

In 1804 and 1805 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin. Among the items paid was 1 year of board for 1804 and 1 year of board for 1805 which was recorded on 20 Sep 1806 and sworn to before John Custis & Jno. Burton. It is not clear to whom this was paid. Sally married Waitman Willett on 5 Mar 1806.¹²

In July 1806 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was cash paid for 4 months borad and cash paid to Richard Bundick for 4 months of schooling. Another account for William White orphan of Levin to John Custis shows entries for 26 Feb 1806, 27 May 1806, 29 Dec 1806, 13 Mar 1807, 25 Apr 1807 and 7 Sep 1807. Two of these entries included pocket money and £10.0.0. was paid to John Custis for "my trouble & expenses settling your estate with your fathers ... and renting our your land and negroes for 2 years." ¹¹³

In 1808 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was 4 months and 12 days schooling. Another account in 1809 showed 11 days of schooling and expenses for keeping and letting out Negroes.¹

William was listed with another family in the census of 1810 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.² He was probably the male, age 16-26 (bc 1784-1794) in a household headed by Waitman Willett.

William was named as administrator of an estate 22 Feb 1813 in Accomack Co, VA.³ It was on this date that administration was granted to William A. White on the estate of William (probably Waitman) Willett. Thomas West & James Watson were securities.

On 17 Feb 1815 William A. White was an appraiser of the estate Benjamin Prewit along with Thomas Hickman, John Y. Bagwell & Thomas R. Riley. (NOTE: Benjamin Prewit's daughter Henny married Richard A. White the next year.)⁴

On 23 Feb 1818 William A. White and George Dix were the securities on the estate of Tabitha Bundick.⁵

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1820 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ He was shown as William A. White head of a household on page 54A, age 26-45 (born 1775-1794). Listed with him was another male, age 26-45; 1 female, age 10-16; 1 female, age over 45; and 2 slaves.

William was the security on a M.L.B. dated 7 Dec 1820 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ It was on this date that William A. White was the security on the M.L.B. of Thomas White of Joachin and Elizabeth Snead, widow of William.

William was named as administrator of an estate 31 May 1824 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ Evidently it took over 10 years to finally settle the estate of Waitman Willett. Shortly after administration of his estate (shown as William Willett) was granted to William A. White on 22 Feb 1813 an inventory was taken on 3 Mar 1813 followed by a sale on 4 Mar 1813. However some 11 years passed before it was finalized by an audit on 26 Feb 1824 which was recorded on 31 May 1824. William A. White was shown as Admr. Appraisers: Levi Dix, Thomas Hickman B.S. & George Wright. Buyer: Sarah Willett. Cash paid Richard White for his orphan claim due by the estate. Auditors: Levi Dix & William Bagwell (Acc Co Wills &c, 1823-24, p. 526) (NOTE: Evidently William A. White and Richard White were Sarah's step-children by her previsous marriage to their father Levin White and when she married Waitman Willett in 1806, he became the guardian to Richard White who was still under age. According to the 1850 census Richard was born in 1796 and would have been 17 years old in 1813 when Waitman Willett died and had a claim against his estate. William A. White was evidently old enough to become the administrator of Waitman Willett's estate.)

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1830 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁹ He was shown as William A. White a head of household on page 318, age 30-40 (bc 1790-1800). Listed with him was 1 male, age 0-5; 1 male, age 5-10; 1 female, age 0-5; 2 females, age 5-10; and 1 female, age 20-30 and 2 slaves.

His wife Peggy had evidently died by 29 Apr 1839 as a guardian bond showed that William A. White was to pay the children of Wm. A. White: Sally, Nancy, Levin, Richard, James & William when they attained lawful age. Signed: Wm. A. White, Southey W. Bull, Edmd B. Ayres & William Copes. (NOTE: This document contains the original signature of Wm. A. White and might be a better listing of the actual birth order of the chidren.) This was probably Peggy's share of her father Levin Crowson's estate, who died without a will by 30 Jul 1838.¹⁰

William was named as an heir 25 Feb 1840 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that a record of receipt was recorded wherein it was noted that received of William East Admr. of Levin Crowson dec'd, each the sum of \$305.63 ½ being in full of our Right as Heirs to the said Levin Crowson dec'd estate.

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1840 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹
He was shown as William A. White a head of household on page 84, age 50-60 (bond 1780-1790). Listed

with him was 3 males, age 5-10; 1 male, age 10-15; 2 females, age 15-20; and 1 slave.

He made a will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.² To my daughters Sally White & Nancy White & my 4 sons Levin White, Richard White, James White & William White the whole of my personal estate. My land whereon I now reside shall be sold & the amount to my 2 daughters & 4 sons. To my daughter Dimeriah Lewis 16 2/3 cents. Thomas J. Rayfield Extr. Witt: William Copes & Francis R. Ayres.

There was a deed of 29 Dec 1843 between Thomas J. Rayfield executor of Wm. A. White dec'd of Accomack Co, VA, and Thomas Hickman B.S. of the same place, for \$543.50 paid by Thomas Hickman, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do sell to Thomas Hickman a tract of land which William A. White died seized of in Acc Co & situated by the parish line containing 55 acres more or less bounded Northeasterly by land of Henry B. White, Southeasterly by land of Richard White, Southwesterly by land of aforesaid Thomas Hickman, Northwesterly by land of George T. Ewell, to have to hold the said 55 acres.³

On 23 Feb 1846 a receipt was given to Wm. A. White's Admr. from Wm. A. White's children's guardian (Acc Co Deed Bk 1844-1846, p. 584).

William Ayres White and Demariah Dix had the following child:

i. Demariah¹ White⁴ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1818.⁵ Demariah died by 11 Apr 1896 at 77 years of age.⁶ She was shown as Demira Lewis, aged about 70, widow of Thomas D. Lewis - PE 11 Apr 1896. She married Thomas D. Lewis 11 May 1842 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ He was shown as Thomas D. Lewis and she was shown as Demeriah White. No other information was given.

Thomas was born circa 1817 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ Thomas ⁹ was the son of John Lewis and Tabitha Drummond. Thomas died by 11 Apr 1896 at 78 years of age.¹⁰ Thomas was listed as a head of household in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ He was shown as Thos. D. Lewis the head of HH#56, a 33 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$3,000. Listed with him were Damariah D. Lewis, age 29; Lorin Lewis, age 12 and black; and Jesse Young, age 13 and black.

Thomas was listed as a head of household in the census of 1860 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹² He was the head of HH#45, age 46 and a farmer. His wife Demania, age 42 was the only other one in the household.

Demariah was named in her father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ She was named as daughter Dimeriah Lewis and given 16 2/3 cents.

Demariah was listed with her husband in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁴ She was shown as Damariah D. Lewis, age 29 in HH#56 headed by Thos. D. Lewis, a 33 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$3,000.

Demariah was listed with her husband in the census of 1860 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹

William Ayres White and Margaret 'Peggy' Crowson had the following children:

4 ii. Sally White² was born in Accomack Co, VA 1827.³ Sally died 26 Oct 1909 at 82 years of age.⁴ Her tombstone shows her as Sallie Littleton, buried next to Thomas Littleton, who died 26 Oct 1909 aged 82 years. Her body was interred in Modest Town Baptist Ch Cem, Acc Co, VA.⁵ She was originally buried in the Littleton Plot near Modest Town, but since moved to the Modest Town Church Cemetery. She married Thomas Littleton 24 Mar 1847 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ James T. Hinman and Charles Wright were the securities on the M.L.B. of Thomas Littleton and Sally White of William A.

Thomas was born 6 Jan 1825 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ Thomas ⁸ was the son of George Littleton and Susan 'Sukey' Sparrow. Thomas died 13 Feb 1903 at 78 years of age.⁸ His body was interred in Modest Town Baptist Ch Cem, Acc Co, VA.¹⁰ Thomas was listed as a head of household in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ He was shown as Thomas Littleton the head of HH#680, a 24 year old farmer. Listed with him were Sally Littleton, age 25; Margaret Littleton, age 1; Mary T. Littleton, age 1/12; Richard White, a 17 year old laborer; and Nancy White, age 22.

Thomas was listed as a head of household in the census of 1860 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹² He was shown as Thomas Littleton the head of HH#605, a 33 year old farmer with personal property valued at \$1,075. Listed with him were the following Littletons: Sally, age 34; Margaret, age 12; Mary, age 11; Oswell J., age 2; and Zidock, age 1. Also listed was David Wright, a 20 year old farm hand.

Thomas was named in his father's will 31 Mar 1866 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ He was shown as as son Thomas Littleton in the will of George Littleton.

Sally was named in her father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ She was shown as a daughter Sally White in the will of William A. White.

Sally was listed with her husband in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁵ She was shown as Sally Littleton, age 25 in HH#680 headed by Thomas Littleton, a 24 year old farmer.

Sally was named in her brother's will 22 Sep 1854 in Accomack Co, VA. 16 She was shown as my sister Sally Littleton, wife of Thomas Littleton, in the will of Levin White

Sally was listed with her husband in the census of 1860 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁷ She was shown as Sally Littleton, age 34 in HH#605 headed by

Thos. Littleton, a 33 year old farmer.

5 iii. Nancy White¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1828.² Nancy was named in her father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.³ Nancy was listed with her sister in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁴ She was shown as Nancy White, age 22 in HH#680 headed by Thomas Littleton, a 24 year old farmer. Also listed was Sally Littleton, age 25, who was her sister.

Nancy was named in her brother's will 22 Sep 1854 in Accomack Co, VA.5

6 iv. Levin White⁶ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1830. Levin died by 27 Dec 1858 in Accomack Co, VA, at 28 years of age.⁷ It was on this date that his will was probated. There being no Extr. named, Thomas Littleton became the Admr. with George Littleton & William H. Dix as his securities.

Levin was named in his father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ He made a will 22 Sep 1854 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ The whole of my property to my 4 own brothers & sisters Sally Littleton, wife of Thomas Littleton & my sister Nancy White & my brother Richard White & my brother James White. Witt: Zorobabel Chandler & George Littleton. His will names his sister Sally Littleton and her marriage shows her as the daughter of William A. White and William A. White's will shows a son Levin.

v. Richard White¹⁰ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1833.¹¹ Richard died Feb 1870 in Atlantic, Acc Co, VA, at 36 years of age.¹² According to the 1870 Federal Mortality Census, he was shown as Richard White, with family #199, HH#200, in Atlantic District, a 35 year old farm laborer, who died in Feb 1870 of heart disease. This aligns with his surviving family, headed by Frances White, age 30, head of family #199, HH#200. His widow Frances didn't marry Wm. J. Kollock until 18 Nov 1877. He married Frances A. Baylis 31 Aug 1857 (lic) in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ He was shown as Richard White and she was shown as Frances Baylis, daughter of K.B., who gave consent. John W. Taylor said he was over age 21.

Frances was born 17 May 1841 in Delaware.¹⁴ Frances ¹⁵ was the daughter of Kendall B. Baylis and Mary A. (-----). She married William J. Kollock 18 Nov 1877 in Chincoteague, Acc Co, VA. She married William J. Benson 7 May 1896 in Chincoteague, Acc Co, VA.¹⁶ Frances died 23 May 1914 at 73 years of age.¹⁷ Frances was listed with her parents in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁸ She was shown as Frances A. Baylis, age 11 and born in DE, in HH#366 headed by Kendall Baylis, a 34 year old sailor born in DE.

Frances was listed with her husband in the census of 1860 in Accomack

Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹ She was shown as Frances White, age 21 in HH#720 headed by Richard White, age 27.

Frances was listed as a head of household in the census of 1870 in Modest Town, Acc Co, VA.² She was shown as Frances White head of HH#200, family #199, a 30 year old house keeper. Listed with her were the following Whites: William, a 12 year old farm laborer; Thomas, a 10 year old farm laborer; and Jeff, age 9.

Richard was named in his father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.³ Richard was listed with his sister in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁴ He was shown as Richard White, a 17 year old laborer in HH#680 headed by Thomas Littleton, a 24 year old farmer. Also listed was Sally Littleton, age 25, who was his sister.

Richard was named in his brother's will 22 Sep 1854 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1860 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ He was shown as Richard White the head of HH#720, age 27 and without occupation with personal property valued at \$90. Listed with him were the following Whites: Frances, age 21; Wm. H., age 2 and Hiram F., age 6/12.

8 vi. James White⁷ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1835.⁸ He married Ofelia Fox 17 Aug 1871 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ He was shown as James White, a 28 year farmer the son of Wm. A. White and she was shown as age 22, the daughter of James & Nelly Fox. They were married by P. A. Leatherbury.

Ofelia was born circa 1850 in Accomack Co, VA. Ofelia ¹⁰ was the daughter of James J. Fox and Eleanor 'Nelly' Lilliston. Ofelia died 2 Dec 1904 in Accomack Co, VA, at 54 years of age.¹¹

James was named in his father's will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² James was listed with another family in the cenus of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹³ He was shown as Jas. White, age 15 in HH#291 headed by Geo. P. Ewell Jr., a 42 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$3,000.

James was named in his brother's will 22 Sep 1854 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ He was shown as a brother James White in the will of Levin White.

James was listed with another family in the cenus of 1860 in Onancock P.O., St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁵ He was shown as James White, a 27 year old store clerk in HH#168 along with Geo. W. Custis, a 29 year old merchant.

1800. Margaret died by 29 Apr 1839 at 38 years of age.¹ Peggy had evidently died by this date as her husband William A. White was to pay their children: Sally, Nancy, Levin, Richard, James & William when they attained lawful age. This was probably Peggy's share of her father Levin Crowson's estate, who died without a will by 30 Jul 1838.

She married **William Ayres White** 19 Dec 1821 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.² Levin Crowson was the security on the M.L.B. of William A. White (widower) and Margaret Crowson of Levin.

William was born 1784-1790 in Accomack Co, VA.³ William was the son of Levin (of Sol) White and Sarah 'Sally' Ayres. He married **Demariah Dix** 27 Apr 1814 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ William died by 26 Jun 1843 in Accomack Co, VA, at 58 years of age.⁵ William was listed with his mother in the census of 1800 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ In 1800 he would have been one of the males, age 10-16 (bc 1784-1790) in the household headed by Sally White (Levin).

In 1804 and 1805 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin. Among the items paid was 1 year of board for 1804 and 1 year of board for 1805 which was recorded on 20 Sep 1806 and sworn to before John Custis & Jno. Burton. It is not clear to whom this was paid. Sally married Waitman Willett on 5 Mar 1806.⁷

In July 1806 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was cash paid for 4 months borad and cash paid to Richard Bundick for 4 months of schooling. Another account for William White orphan of Levin to John Custis shows entries for 26 Feb 1806, 27 May 1806, 29 Dec 1806, 13 Mar 1807, 25 Apr 1807 and 7 Sep 1807. Two of these entries included pocket money and £10.0.0. was paid to John Custis for "my trouble & expenses settling your estate with your fathers ... and renting our your land and negroes for 2 years."

In 1808 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for William White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was 4 months and 12 days schooling. Another account in 1809 showed 11 days of schooling and expenses for keeping and letting out Negroes.⁹

William was listed with another family in the cenus of 1810 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁰ He was probably the male, age 16-26 (bc 1784-1794) in a household headed by Waitman Willett.

William was named as administrator of an estate 22 Feb 1813 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that administration was granted to William A. White on the estate of William (probably Waitman) Willett. Thomas West & James Watson were securities.

On 17 Feb 1815 William A. White was an appraiser of the estate Benjamin Prewit along with Thomas Hickman, John Y. Bagwell & Thomas R. Riley. (NOTE: Benjamin Prewit's daughter Henny married Richard A. White the next year.)¹²

On 23 Feb 1818 William A. White and George Dix were the securities on the estate of Tabitha Bundick.¹³

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1820 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁴ He was shown as William A. White head of a household on page 54A, age 26-45 (born 1775-1794). Listed with him was another male, age 26-45; 1 female, age 10-16; 1 female, age over 45; and 2 slaves.

William was the security on a M.L.B. dated 7 Dec 1820 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁵ It was on this date that William A. White was the security on the M.L.B. of Thomas White of Joachin and Elizabeth Snead, widow of William.

William was named as administrator of an estate 31 May 1824 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ Evidently it took over 10 years to finally settle the estate of Waitman Willett. Shortly after administration of his estate (shown as William Willett) was granted to William A. White on 22 Feb 1813 an inventory was taken on 3 Mar 1813 followed by a sale on 4 Mar 1813. However some 11 years passed before it was finalized by an audit on 26 Feb 1824 which was recorded on 31 May 1824. William A. White was shown as Admr. Appraisers: Levi Dix, Thomas Hickman B.S. & George Wright. Buyer: Sarah Willett. Cash paid Richard White for his orphan claim due by the estate. Auditors: Levi Dix & William Bagwell (Acc Co Wills &c, 1823-24, p. 526) (NOTE: Evidently William A. White and Richard White were Sarah's step-children by her previsous marriage to their father Levin White and when she married Waitman Willett in 1806, he became the guardian to Richard White who was still under age. According to the 1850 census Richard was born in 1796 and would have been 17 years old in 1813 when Waitman Willett died and had a claim against his estate. William A. White was evidently old enough to become the administrator of Waitman Willett's estate.)

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1830 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.² He was shown as William A. White a head of household on page 318, age 30-40 (bc 1790-1800). Listed with him was 1 male, age 0-5; 1 male, age 5-10; 1 female, age 0-5; 2 females, age 5-10; and 1 female, age 20-30 and 2 slaves.

His wife Peggy had evidently died by 29 Apr 1839 as a guardian bond showed that William A. White was to pay the children of Wm. A. White: Sally, Nancy, Levin, Richard, James & William when they attained lawful age. Signed: Wm. A. White, Southey W. Bull, Edmd B. Ayres & William Copes. (NOTE: This document contains the original signature of Wm. A. White and might be a better listing of the actual birth order of the chidren.) This was probably Peggy's share of her father Levin Crowson's estate, who died without a will by 30 Jul 1838.³

William was named as an heir 25 Feb 1840 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ It was on this date that a record of receipt was recorded wherein it was noted that received of William East Admr. of Levin Crowson dec'd, each the sum of \$305.63 ½ being in full of our Right as Heirs to the said Levin Crowson dec'd estate. Signed: Francis R. Ayres, Levin [X] Crowson, Wm. A. White, Thos [X] Crowson, John [X] Fluhart.

William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1840 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁵ He was shown as William A. White a head of household on page 84, age 50-60 (bond 1780-1790). Listed with him was 3 males, age 5-10; 1 male, age 10-15; 2 females, age 15-20; and 1 slave.

He made a will 20 Apr 1843 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ To my daughters Sally White & Nancy White & my 4 sons Levin White, Richard White, James White & William White the whole of my personal estate. My land whereon I now reside shall be sold & the amount to my 2 daughters & 4 sons. To my daughter Dimeriah Lewis 16 2/3 cents. Thomas J. Rayfield Extr. Witt: William Copes & Francis R. Ayres.

There was a deed of 29 Dec 1843 between Thomas J. Rayfield executor of Wm. A. White dec'd of Accomack Co, VA, and Thomas Hickman B.S. of the same place, for \$543.50 paid by Thomas Hickman, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, do sell to Thomas Hickman a tract of land which William A. White died seized of in Acc Co & situated by the parish line containing 55 acres more or less bounded Northeasterly by land of Henry B. White, Southeasterly by land of Richard White, Southwesterly by land of aforesaid Thomas Hickman, Northwesterly by land of George T. Ewell, to have to hold the said 55 acres.⁷

On 23 Feb 1846 a receipt was given to Wm. A. White's Admr. from Wm. A. White's children's guardian (Acc Co Deed Bk 1844-1846, p. 584). (See William Ayres White for the children resulting from this marriage.)

Margaret was named in her grandmother's will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ She was shown as a granddaughter Peggy Crowson, daughter of Levin Crowson, in the will of Susannah Turnall.

Margaret was named as an heir 31 Jan 1831 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ It was on this date that Margaret White, wife of William A. White, formerly Margaret Crowson, was named as one of the heirs of James Powell dec'd. (Accomack Co, VA Deed Book 25, 1830-32, p. 68)

10. Levin (of Sol)³ White (Solomon⁴, Simcock⁵, William⁶, William⁷)¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1765. Levin died by 28 Jan 1799 in Accomack Co, VA, at 33 years of age.2 It was on this date that administration of his estate was granted to Sally White. Francis Ayres & Edmund Ayres were securities.

He married Sarah 'Sally' Ayres circa 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.3 Sarah was born 1757-1774 in Accomack Co, VA.4 Sarah 5 was the daughter of Jacob Ayres. She married Waitman Willett 5 Mar 1806 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ Sarah died by 26 Aug 1822 in Accomack Co, VA, at 65 years of age.⁷ Sarah was named in her father's will 25 May 1778 in Accomack Co, VA.8 She was shown as an underage daughter Sally in the will of Jacob Ayres.

Sarah was named as administrator of an estate 28 Jan 1799 in Accomack Co. VA.9 It was on this date that the estate of Levin White was administered to Sally White. Francis Ayres & Edmund Ayres were securities. (NOTE: Francis and Edmund Ayres were evidently her brothers.)

Sarah was listed as a head of household in the census of 1800 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.10 She was shown as Sally White (Levin) the head of a household on page 27, age 26-45 (bc 1755-1774). Listed with her were 2 males, age 0-10; 2 males, age 10-16; and another female age 26-45; and 3 slaves.

Sarah was named as administrator of an estate 1 Nov 1806 in Accomack Co, VA.11 1 Nov 1806 (Audit), 27 Jan 1807 Rec'd) When Levin White's estate settlement was recorded and the administrator was shown as Sarah White. The auditors were John Wise & Richard D. Bayly.

Sarah was listed with her husband in the census of 1810 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.12 Sally would have been the female age over 45 (born before 1775) in the household headed by Waitman Willett. Sarah Willett was a buyer at the 4 Mar 1813 estate sale of Waitman Willett. 13

She made a will 28 Jun 1822 in Accomack Co, VA.14 To daughter Sally Willett 10 acres on road leading from Sea Side to Bagwell's Store adjoining land of Solomon White, John S. Dix, Thomas Hickman & heirs of David Melson & ... & remainder. Friend John Y. Bagwell Extr. Witt: James H. Dix, John S. Dix & Josiah Spreight. (NOTE: Since she named only a daughter Sally Willett in her will, it is possible that the other children of Waitman Willett and those of her first husband Levin White were her step-children.)

Sarah estate was settled 2 Sep 1824 in Accomack Co, VA.15 31 Aug 1822 & 26 Jul 1824 (Invy), 5 Sep 1822 (Sale), 30 Jul 1824 (Audit), 2 Sep 1824 (Rec'd) - Appraisers: James H. Dix, William Riley & Thomas W. Blackstone. John Y. Bagwell Extr. Buyer: Sally Willett. Cash paid to Richard White orphan account.

Levin was named in his father's will 25 Oct 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.16 He was shown as a son Levin White in the will of Solomon White and was given the remaining part of my land, which was near John Dix Sr. and Richard Grinalds.

Levin witnessed a will 8 Dec 1789 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ It was on this date that Levin White and John Dix Jr. witnessed the will of Galen White.

Levin was named as the executor of a will 6 Dec 1790 in Accomack Co, VA.² It was on this date that Levin White and Richard Bundick were Extrs for the estate of Benjamin West, son John. Benjamin named Arabella White and Lucretia White in his will. Levin became the gaurdian to Benjamin's son John.

John West, orphan of Benjamin West dec'd, had an orphan accout payable to Levin White starting on 24 Sep 1791 and continuing thru 31 Oct 1797, and then after Levin's death in 1799 it was payable to Levin's wife Sally White in Dec 1799.³

On 30 Dec 1794 Levin White and Thomas Bayly were securities when Francis Ayres was granted administration on the estate of Richard Ayres.⁴

Levin was living 18 Jan 1795 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ It was on this date that William Prewit wrote his will and left his son John 4 acres on the north side of the Church Road adjacent to the land of Thomas Bayly, Levin White & Levin Ayres. According to Whitelaw the Old Church Road was part of tract A78 in the Tasley area.

Levin was living 4 Mar 1796 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ It was on this date that Smith Melson Sr. wrote his will left his son Smith Melson 100 acres where I now live adjacent to the land of Sophia Drummond, Daniel Melson, Levin White & Thomas Bayly. According to Whitelaw, this was the Smith Melson Part of tract A100 which is between the main north and south forks of Hunting Creek south of Parksley. It is interesting to note that tract A101 was originally patented in 1667 to William White for 400 acres and in tracing the ownership Whitelaw shows Willetts, Benjamin Prewett, Eijah Lilliston owning parts of this tract and in 1807 Elijah Lilliston sold 28 acres to Thomas Hickman.

Levin estate was settled 27 Jan 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ The audit on his estate was returned on 1 Nov 1806 and was recorded on 27 Jan 1807. Sarah White was the administrator. The auditors were John Wise and Richard D. Bayly.

Levin (of Sol) White and Sarah 'Sally' Ayres had the following children:

- + 2 i. William Ayres² White was born 1784-1790 and died by 26 Jun 1843.
 - ii. Richard Ayres White Sr.⁸ was born in Accomack Co, VA 31 Dec 1797.⁹ Since his tombstone shows 31 Dec 1795 or 1797, the earlier is assumed, since he was married in 1816 and this would make him age 21 (instead of age 19) when married. Richard died 29 Mar 1869 at 71 years of age.¹⁰ His body was interred in Clover Hill, Pastoria, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ His tombstone shows him as Richard A. White, husband of Henrietta & son of Levin & Sally White, 31 Dec 1797(5?) 29 Mar 1869, stone is broken. He married Henrietta R. 'Henny' Pruitt 7 Oct 1816 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.¹² Charles Lewis was the security on the M.L.B. of Richard White of Levin and Henrietta R. Prewit.

Henrietta was born 18 Sep 1800 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ Henrietta ² was the daughter of Benjamin Pruitt and Ritter Melson. Henrietta died 1 Jul 1874 in Accomack Co, VA, at 73 years of age.³ Her body was interred in Clover Hill, Pastoria, Acc Co, VA.⁴ On 20 Dec 1815 Ritter Pruitt received from John Custis, adm. of Benjamin Pruitt, £50.15.10 belonging to herself and her daughter Henny Pruitt, who she was guardian to.⁵

Henrietta was listed with her husband in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ She was shown as Henny White, age 48 in HH#340 headed by Rich'd White Sr., a 54 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$2,500.

Henrietta was listed with her husband in the census of 1860 in Wiseville PO, St.George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁷ She was shown as Henny White, age 58 in HH#113 headed by Rich'd A. White, a 64 year old farmer.

Henrietta was listed with her daughter in the census of 1870 in Locust Mount PO, St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁸ She was shown as Henny White, age 64 and at home with real estate valued at \$1,200 in HH#LM1583 headed by J.W. Grinnels, a 34 year old farmer. Also listed was Marg't T. Grinnels, a 24 year old house keepers, who was evidently her daughter.

She made a will 25 Jan 1872 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ She was shown as Henrietta White. To daughter Margaret T. Grinnalds, wife of John W. Grinnalds the land on which I now reside, 100 acres. In consideration, son-in-law John W. Grinnalds to pay my 2 grandchildren, Margaret A. E. Gray and Levin White Gray, each \$300. To granddaughter Margaret A. E. Gray. To grandson Levin White Gray. To granddaughter Henrietta Grinnalds. To grandson William T. Grinnalds. The residue to daughter Margaret T. Grinnalds. Friend John R. Drummond exec. Wit: O. P. Drummond, Fletcher Drummond, L. J. Gunter.

Richard was listed with his mother in the census of 1800 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁰ He was probably one of the 2 males, age 0-10 (bc 1790-1800) in the household headed by Sally White (Levin).

In Jul and Dec of 1806 in Accomack Co, VA, 2 orphan accounts were recorded for Richard White, orphan of Levin, to Wtm. Willit, guardian. A total of £8.19.5 was paid to Willit for various expenses and there was a credit for estate of £79.0.0 and land rent of £10.0.0. Cash was paid to Rich'd Bundick and to George Poulson for schooling and most of the other expenses were clothing and shoes, etc.¹¹

In 1808 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for Richard White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was 3 months and 10 days schooling and 3 1/2 months board.¹²

In 1809 in Accomack County, an orphan account was recorded for Richard White, orphan of Levin, to Waitman Willit, guardian. Among the items paid was 6 months schooling and 6 months board.¹³

Richard was listed with another family in the cenus of 1810 in Accomack

Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹ He was probably the male, age 10-16 (bc 1794-1800) in the household headed by Waitman Willett.

Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1820 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.² He was shown as Richard White, age 16-26 (bc 1794-1804) a head of household on page 54A. Listed with him was 1 male, age 0-10; 1 female, age 0-10; 1 female, age 16-26; 1 female age over 45; and 3 slaves.

When Waitman Willett's estate was finally settled, an audit of 26 Feb 1824 showed William A. White was the administrator and Sarah Willett was a buyer. Cash was paid Richard White for his orphan claim due by the estate. (NOTE: Evidently William A. White and Richard White were Sarah's step-children by her previsous marriage to Levin White and when she married Waitman Willett in 1806, he became the guardian to Richard White who was still under age. According to the 1850 census Richard was born in 1796 and would have been 17 years old in 1813 when Waitman Willett died and had a claim against his estate. William A. White was evidently old enough to become the administrator of Waitman Willett's estate.)³

On 30 Jul 1824 when the audit was made on the estate of Sally Willett it showed cash paid to Richard White's orphan account.⁴

Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1830 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁵ He was shown as Richard A. White, age 30-40 (bond 1790-1800), a head of household on page 318. Listed with him was 1 male, age 15-20; 1 female, age 10-15; 2 females, age 20-30; 1 female, age 70-80; and 5 slaves.

Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1840 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ He was shown as Richard A. White, age 40-50 (bc 1790-1800), a head of household on page 84. Listed with him was 1 female, age 0-5; 1 female, age 20-30; 1 female, age 30-40; 1 female, age 80-90; and 8 slaves.

Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁷ He was shown as Rich'd White Sr. the head of HH#340, a 54 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$2,500. Listed with him were the following Whites: Henny, age 48; Ann A., age 31; and Margaret, age 11.

Richard was listed as a head of household in the census of 1860 in Wiseville PO, St.George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁸ He was shown as Rich'd A. White, the head of HH#113, a 64 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$4,000 and personal property valued at \$17,800. Listed with him were Henny White, age 58 and Marg't White, age 19.

12. **Sarah 'Sally'** Ayres (Jacob⁴, Francis⁵, Francis⁶, John⁷)⁹ was born in Accomack Co, VA 1757-1774. The 1800 census puts her birth 1755-1774, the 1810 census puts it at before 1775 and she was underage 21 in her father's will of 1778 (born after 1757). Sarah died by 26 Aug 1822 in Accomack Co, VA, at 65 years of age. It was on this date that her will was probated with Levi Dix & Thomas Lewis of Spencer securities.

She married twice. She married Levin (of Sol) White circa 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.12 Levin was

born circa 1765 in Accomack Co, VA. Levin ¹ was the son of Solomon White carpenter and (d|o Charles) Snead. Levin died by 28 Jan 1799 in Accomack Co, VA, at 33 years of age.² Levin was named in his father's will 25 Oct 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.³ He was shown as a son Levin White in the will of Solomon White and was given the remaining part of my land, which was near John Dix Sr. and Richard Grinalds.

Levin witnessed a will 8 Dec 1789 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ It was on this date that Levin White and John Dix Jr. witnessed the will of Galen White.

Levin was named as the executor of a will 6 Dec 1790 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ It was on this date that Levin White and Richard Bundick were Extrs for the estate of Benjamin West, son John. Benjamin named Arabella White and Lucretia White in his will. Levin became the gaurdian to Benjamin's son John.

John West, orphan of Benjamin West dec'd, had an orphan accout payable to Levin White starting on 24 Sep 1791 and continuing thru 31 Oct 1797, and then after Levin's death in 1799 it was payable to Levin's wife Sally White in Dec 1799.6

On 30 Dec 1794 Levin White and Thomas Bayly were securities when Francis Ayres was granted administration on the estate of Richard Ayres.⁷

Levin was living 18 Jan 1795 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was on this date that William Prewit wrote his will and left his son John 4 acres on the north side of the Church Road adjacent to the land of Thomas Bayly, Levin White & Levin Ayres. According to Whitelaw the Old Church Road was part of tract A78 in the Tasley area.

Levin was living 4 Mar 1796 in Accomack Co, VA.^o It was on this date that Smith Melson Sr. wrote his will left his son Smith Melson 100 acres where I now live adjacent to the land of Sophia Drummond, Daniel Melson, Levin White & Thomas Bayly. According to Whitelaw, this was the Smith Melson Part of tract A100 which is between the main north and south forks of Hunting Creek south of Parksley. It is interesting to note that tract A101 was originally patented in 1667 to William White for 400 acres and in tracing the ownership Whitelaw shows Willetts, Benjamin Prewett, Eijah Lilliston owning parts of this tract and in 1807 Elijah Lilliston sold 28 acres to Thomas Hickman.

Levin estate was settled 27 Jan 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ The audit on his estate was returned on 1 Nov 1806 and was recorded on 27 Jan 1807. Sarah White was the administrator. The auditors were John Wise and Richard D. Bayly.

She married **Waitman Willett** 5 Mar 1806 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ Daniel Melson was the security on the M.L.B. of Waitman Willett and Sarah White (widow of Levin).

Waitman was born 1765-1784 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² Waitman ¹³ was the son of William Willett and Gertrude (-----). He married **Dany Trader** circa 1800. Waitman died by 22 Feb 1813 in Accomack Co, VA, at 37 years of age.¹⁴ Waitman was listed as a head of household in the census of 1810 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁵ He was shown as Waitman Willett, age 26-45 (bc 1765-1784), a head of household on page 134. Listed with him was 1 male, age 10-16; 1 male, age 16-26; 1 female, age 0-10; 1 female, age 16-26; 1 female, age over 45; and 2 slaves.

Sarah was named in her father's will 25 May 1778 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ She was shown as an underage daughter Sally in the will of Jacob Ayres.

Sarah was named as administrator of an estate 28 Jan 1799 in Accomack Co, VA.² It was on this date that the estate of Levin White was administered to Sally White. Francis Ayres & Edmund Ayres were securities. (NOTE: Francis and Edmund Ayres were evidently her brothers.)

Sarah was listed as a head of household in the census of 1800 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.³ She was shown as Sally White (Levin) the head of a household on page 27, age 26-45 (bc 1755-1774). Listed with her were 2 males, age 0-10; 2 males, age 10-16; and another female age 26-45; and 3 slaves.

Sarah was named as administrator of an estate 1 Nov 1806 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ 1 Nov 1806 (Audit), 27 Jan 1807 Rec'd) When Levin White's estate settlement was recorded and the administrator was shown as Sarah White. The auditors were John Wise & Richard D. Bavlv.

Sarah was listed with her husband in the census of 1810 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁵ Sally would have been the female age over 45 (born before 1775) in the household headed by Waitman Willett. Sarah Willett was a buyer at the 4 Mar 1813 estate sale of Waitman Willett.⁶

She made a will 28 Jun 1822 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ To daughter Sally Willett 10 acres on road leading from Sea Side to Bagwell's Store adjoining land of Solomon White, John S. Dix, Thomas Hickman & heirs of David Melson & ... & remainder. Friend John Y. Bagwell Extr. Witt: James H. Dix, John S. Dix & Josiah Spreight. (NOTE: Since she named only a daughter Sally Willett in her will, it is possible that the other children of Waitman Willett and those of her first husband Levin White were her step-children.)

Sarah estate was settled 2 Sep 1824 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ 31 Aug 1822 & 26 Jul 1824 (Invy), 5 Sep 1822 (Sale), 30 Jul 1824 (Audit), 2 Sep 1824 (Rec'd) - Appraisers: James H. Dix, William Riley & Thomas W. Blackstone. John Y. Bagwell Extr. Buyer: Sally Willett. Cash paid to Richard White orphan account.

Sarah 'Sally' Ayres and Waitman Willett had the following child:

i. Sally² Willett⁹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1806.¹⁰ Since she was the ward of Richard J. Ayres when she married in 1825, she would have been under age 21 and thus born after 1804. She married William C. Dix 31 Mar 1825 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ James Taylor was the security on the M.L.B. of William C. Dix and Sally Willett of Waitman, ward of Richard J. Ayres.

William was born 2 Jul 1803 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² He married Hetty Bloxom 6 Oct 1847 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ William died 11 Jul 1854 at 51 years of age.¹⁴ His body was interred in Modest Town Baptist Ch Cem, Acc Co, VA.¹⁵ William was listed as a head of household in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁶ He was shown as William C. Dix the head of HH#558, a 47 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$6,500. Listed with him were the following Dixes: Hetty, age 47; Isaac, an 18 year old laborer; William, age 14; Catharine A., age 12; Levin A., age 9; Robert W., age 7; and Sally, age 7.

Sally was named in her mother's will 28 Jun 1822 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ She was shown as a daughter Sally Willett in the will of Sarah Willett and given 10 acres on the road leading from Sea Side to Bagwell's store adjoining land of Solomon White.

14. **Levin** (366A)³ Crowson (Charles⁴)² was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1765. Levin died by 30 Jul 1838 in Accomack Co, VA, at 73 years of age.³ It was on this date that William East was named to settle the estate of Levin Crowson. Levi Dix & Colmore C. Hinman were securities.

He married **Amey Turnall** 2 Jan 1795 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ Edmund Only was the security on the M.L.B. of Levin Crowson and Amey Powell.

Amey was born circa 1761 in Accomack Co, VA. Amey ⁵ was the daughter of Robert Tunnell and Susannah (----). She married **Peter (535) Powell** circa 1785. Amey was named in her grandfather's will 13 Apr 1762 in Accomack Co, VA. She was shown as a granddaughter Amy Turnal in the will of Robert Turnall.

Amey was named in her husband's will 22 Sep 1793 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ She was shown as a wife Amey in the will of Peter Powell.

Amey was named in her mother's will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ She was shown as Amey Crowson in the will of Susannah Turnal.

Levin was named as the executor of a will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ It was on this date that sons-in-law Levin Crowson & Major Rayfield were named as Extrs. in the will of Susannah Turnal.

Levin witnessed a will 15 Apr 1828 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that Levin Crowson along with Robinson West, Major Scott, Rachel Hogsher & John C. Wise were witnesses to the will of Thomas Showard.

Levin (366A) Crowson had the following child:

i. Comfort² Crowson was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1794. She married John Fluhart 2 Feb 1815 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.¹² John Willet was the security on the M.L.B. of John Flewharte and Comfort Crowson.

John was born circa 1790 in Accomack Co, VA. John was named as an heir 25 Feb 1840 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ It was on this date that a record of receipt was recorded wherein it was noted that received of William East Admr. of Levin Crowson dec'd, each the sum of \$305.63 ½ being in full of our Right as Heirs to the said Levin Crowson dec'd estate. Signed: Francis R. Ayres, Levin [X] Crowson, Wm. A. White, Thos [X] Crowson, John [X] Fluhart.

Comfort was listed with her son in the census of 1850 in Accomack Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁴ She was shown as Comfort Fluhart, age 50 in HH#387 headed by William H. Fluhart, a 33 year old farmer.

Levin (366A) Crowson and Amey Turnall had the following children:

Her body was interred.⁵ Demaria was listed with her husband in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.⁶ She was shown as Dimmeria Crowson, age 31 in HH#282 headed by Levin Crowson, a 45 year old farmer.

Wife & children residual legatees. Brother Nicholas Powell Extr. Witt: William Stran, Richard Dix, Ritter Melson & Isaac Dix.

She married **Levin (366A) Crowson** 2 Jan 1795 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ Edmund Only was the security on the M.L.B. of Levin Crowson and Amey Powell.

Levin was born circa 1765 in Accomack Co, VA. Levin ⁸ was the son of Charles Crowson and Comfort (127) West. Levin died by 30 Jul 1838 in Accomack Co, VA, at 73 years of age. ⁹ Levin was named as the executor of a will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA. ¹⁰ It was on this date that sons-in-law Levin Crowson & Major Rayfield were named as Extrs. in the will of Susannah Turnal.

Levin witnessed a will 15 Apr 1828 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that Levin Crowson along with Robinson West, Major Scott, Rachel Hogsher & John C. Wise were witnesses to the will of Thomas Showard.

Amey was named in her grandfather's will 13 Apr 1762 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² She was shown as a granddaughter Amy Turnal in the will of Robert Turnall.

Amey was named in her husband's will 22 Sep 1793 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ She was shown as a wife Amey in the will of Peter Powell.

Amey was named in her mother's will 16 Feb 1807 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ She was shown as Amey Crowson in the will of Susannah Turnal.

Churn 11 Jan 1831 (bond) in Northampton Co, VA.¹ Sally was listed with her husband in the census of 1850 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.² She was shown as Sally Churn, age 55 in HH#353 headed by Wm. Churn, a 47 year old farmer with real estate valued at \$350.

James was named in his father's will 22 Sep 1793 in Accomack Co, VA.³ He was shown as a son James Powell in the will of Peter Powell, wife Amey.

James was named in his uncle's will 21 Jan 1795 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ He was shown as Gim Powell, the son of Peter Powell, in the will of Nickless Powell.

James sold land 7 Nov 1828 in Accomack Co. VA.⁵ James Powell late of Acc Co, VA did by his deed of mortgage of 7 Nov 1828 convey unto Thomas Hickman Jnr. A tract of land containing by estimation 100 acres more or less and bounded Northeasterly by the lands of the heirs of David Melson dec'd, Northwesterly by the lands of Smith Melson, Southwesterly by the lands of Thomas W. Blackston and Southeasterly by the lands of Charles Lewis and William A. White. Whereas the money secured by said deed of mortgage has not as yet been paid, but remain due from the estate of James Powell. Now therefore we, Samuel A. Justice and Elizabeth his wife, formerly Elizabeth Powell - Nancy Crowson - William A. White and Margaret his wife formerly Margaret Crowson - Francis Ayres and Susan his wife formerly Susan Crowson - Levin Crowson and Thomas Crowson (which said Elizabeth Justice, Nancy Crowson, Margaret White, Susan Ayres, Levin Crowson and Thomas Crowson, are the only heirs at law of said James Powell dec'd, for and in consideration of the sum of \$1,199.51 paid in hand to them by Thomas Hickman Jr., the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have released, remised, quit claimed transferred and conveyed to the said Thomas Hickman Jnr. all the equity of redemption in said land and all their rights, titles, claims & demands in the premises aforesaid & we will warrant and defend a good & perfect title to the land. Signed & Sealed on 31 Jan 1831 by: Samuel A. Justice, Elizabeth Justice, Nancy [X] Crowson, William A. White, Margaret White, Francis R. Ayres, Susan [X] Ayres. Levin [X] Crowson, Thomas [X] Crowson. ii. Elizabeth Powell⁶ was born in Accomack Co, VA 1794. Elizabeth died by 20 May 1834 at 39 years of age.⁷ It was on this date that her husband Samuel A. Justice married Rose Ann Bloxom. She married Samuel A. Justice 21 Mar 1814 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ Levin Crowson was the security on the M.L.B. of Samuel A. Justice and Elizabeth Powell.

Samuel was born circa 1782 in Accomack Co, VA. Samuel ⁹ was the son of Richard Justice and Rachel Wimbrough. He married Rose Ann Bloxom 20 May 1834 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ He married Mary 'Molly' Mears 10 Aug 1842 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ Samuel died Feb 1847 at 64 years of age.¹² Samuel was named in his mother's will 25 Jun 1818 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ He was shown as a

He made a will 3 Apr 1846 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ To son Thomas Henry Justice ... To daughter Sarah A. Justice Negro girl Clarissa. To my children Thomas, Mary, Amy, Margaret, Ann & Susannah Negro man Levin & woman Pat & if either of the Negroes become disabled than they be maintained by my heirs & that they never be sold beyond the limits of Accomack County. The plantation whereon I live to my children Mary, Amy, Margaret, Ann, Susannah, Thomas Henry & Sarah Ann. Land adjoining the lands of Edmund Baker & others to be sold if need be to pay debts & if not to my children as above named. Friend Littleton A. Hinman Extr. Witt: Sylvester J. Marshall & Peter W. Scringer.

Samuel's will was probated 25 Oct 1847 in Accomack Co, VA.² Partly proved by Sylvester J. Marshall on 22 Feb 1847. Littleton A. Hinman became the Curator with John D. Parks & Edmund R. Allen his securities. On 26 Jul 1847 it was ordered that a Commission issue to the Mayor of the City of Baltimore to authorize the taking & certifying the attestation of Peter W. Scringer, a witness to the will. [Note: The request was sent by the Clerk on 1 Sep 1847 & Peter W. Scringer appeared before the Mayor of the City of Baltimore on 28 Sep 1847 & proved the will.]

Elizabeth was named in her father's will 22 Sep 1793 in Accomack Co, VA.³ She was shown as an unborn child in the will of Peter Powell, wife Amey.

Elizabeth was named as an heir 31 Jan 1831 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ She was shown as Elizabeth Justice, wife of Samuel A. Justice, formerly Elizabeth Powell, one of the heirs of James Powell dec'd. (Accomack Co, VA Deed Book 25, 1830-32, p. 68)

23. **Solomon⁴ White carpenter** (Simcock⁵, William⁶, William⁷)¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1715. Solomon died by 31 Aug 1785 in Accomack Co, VA, at 70 years of age.² It was on this date that his will was probated.

He married twice. He married **Elizabeth Dix** circa 1740 in Accomack Co, VA. Elizabeth was born circa 1712 in Accomack Co, VA. Elizabeth ³ was the daughter of John Dix and Patience (----). Elizabeth was named in her father's will 11 Mar 1718/9 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ She was shown as a daughter Elizabeth Dix in the will of John Dix, wife Patience. She was to live with her brother Isaac until age 18.

He married **(d|o Charles) Snead** circa 1760 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ (d|o Charles) was born circa 1740 in Accomack Co, VA. (d|o Charles) ⁶ was the daughter of Charles Snead and Arabella (----). (d|o Charles) died by 1 Dec 1784 in Accomack Co, VA, at 44 years of age.⁷

Solomon was named as the executor of a will 30 Dec 1740 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was on this date that Isaac Dix named his wife, brother John Dix & Solomon White as Extrs to his estate. Solomon White was to also have the tuition of his son John until he arrived at the age of 21 years. (NOTE: For Solomon to have been given both of these responsibilities, he may have married on of Isaac's sisters or older daughters.)

At a court held in Acc County on 7 Jan 1740/41 Mary Dix, widow, and Solomon White, extrs. of Isaac Dix, swore to the will which was proved, security was John Dix & Peter Copes. Ordered that Edward Bayly, John Simpson, Southey Rew & George Bundick appraise and divide the estate.⁹

On 24 Nov 1741 Jacob Sanders, orphan of John Saunders (sic), who would be 14 years old next March, was bound to Solomon White to become a house carpenter.¹⁰

Solomon bought land 1748 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was in this year that Solomon White bought 75 arcres of Whitelaw's tract A105, which is South and East of Parksley, from Southy Simpson. In 1752 he bought the balance of 125 acres from Simpson. While no survey for any part of the Simpson 200 acres was found, the land was the south-east corner of the tract.

On 10 Jul 1756 Charles West named Elizabeth White, daughter of Solomon White, in his will. 12

On 26 Feb 1765 in Accomack Co, VA, Solomon White was the security on the administration of the estates of both Wrixom White and his dec'd wife Grace White. Adminstration was granted on both estates to Robert Russell.¹³

He made a will 25 Oct 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ To son Solomon White 70 acres adjcent John Dix, Sr. & Richard Grinalds. To son William White 10 acres adjcent the above. To son Levin White the remaining part of my land. To son Galen White. To son George White. Daughters Susanna, Lucretia & Annabella White residual legatees. Daughter Susanna to have the care of my son George's money until he comes of age. Son Solomon & daughter Susanna Exrs. Witt: Thomas Evans, William Grinalds.

Althought no frim proof has been found for the parents of Solomon White, he is assumed to have been a son of Simcock White. This is based on the fact that on 26 Feb 1765 Solomon White was the security on the administration of the estates of both Wrixom White and his dec'd wife Grace White. Administration was granted on both estates to Robert Russell. The assumption is that Solomon was a brother of Wrixom.

Solomon White carpenter and Elizabeth Dix had the following child:

i. Elizabeth³ White¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1742. Elizabeth was named as an heir 10 Jul 1756 in Accomack Co, VA.² She was shown as Elizabeth White, daughter of Solomon White, in the will of Charles West.

iii. Solomon White was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1760.¹¹ The 1830 census shows him as age 50-60, which places his birth between 1770 - 1780. Solomon died by 31 Oct 1831 in Accomack Co, VA, at 71 years of age.¹² The sheriff was named as the administrator. He married Bridget Hickman 20 Aug 1789 in Accomack Co, VA.¹³ They were shown as Solomon White and Bridget Hickman. The record is badly damaged.

Bridget was born circa 1770 in Accomack Co, VA.

March, was bound to Solomon White to become a house carpenter.¹

Solomon bought land 1748 in Accomack Co, VA.² It was in this year that Solomon White bought 75 arcres of Whitelaw's tract A105, which is South and East of Parksley, from Southy Simpson. In 1752 he bought the balance of 125 acres from Simpson. While no survey for any part of the Simpson 200 acres was found, the land was the south-east corner of the tract.

On 10 Jul 1756 Charles West named Elizabeth White, daughter of Solomon White, in his will.3

Rayfield the land where I now reside commencing on Hunting Creek at the line between my land & the land of Thomas Russell of M. & ... & on the line between my land & that belonging to the heirs of James Lewis dec'd & thence to Hunting Creek & he to pay my estate \$800 & to him my slaves for the terms mentioned: Simon Sr., 7 years after my death; Violet, 4 years; Abraham, Isaac, Jacob & Simon Jr. until they shall arrive at age 30, at which time they are to be free, provided they wish to be free & also all the increase of Violet born during her term of service until they reach age 30 & so with the increase of such increase born as aforesaid. My true intent & meaning is that all the increase of the several descendants of the slave Violet through successive generations born before the actual freedom of their respective ancestors shall have accrued according to the provisions hereinbefore contained, shall be the property of my said son Thomas J., until they severally attain age 30 & that then they shall be free, if they desire such freedom. To my grandchildren George W. Powell, John T. Powell, Henry Powell, William Powell, Nancy Parks, the wife of Parker W. Parks, Mary Adams, the wife of James Adams & Elizabeth Lilliston, the wife of Henry P. However, it was not until 4 Apr 1721 that Mary White, widow & relict of Simcock White dec'd, petitioned the court for letters of administration on said estate of her husband dec'd and that he dying intestate... John Justice and Joynas Davis securities.

He married **Mary** (-----) circa 1700 in Accomack Co, VA.³ Mary was born circa 1675. Mary was named as administrator of an estate 4 Apr 1721 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ It was on this date that Mary White, widow & relict of Simcock White dec'd petitioned the court for letters of administration on said estate of her husband dec'd and that he dying intestate... John Justice and Joynas Davis securities.

Simcock bought land 5 Sep 1713 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ It was on this date that Simcock White, wife Mary, bought 150 acres for 7,300 lbs tobacco of tract A121 west of the Baily land and between the two roads (sea side road and US Rt 13) from John [X] Wharton of Somerset County and his wife Susannah Wharton, who relinquished her dower rights on 6 Oct 1713. The deed showed it bounded land owned by Thomas Crippen, John Onions, Roger Miles & Samuel Church. It was witnessed by Jno. Johnson & Francis Wharton. When Simcock White died intestate in 1719 he was succeeded by a son Wrixham White (wife Grace who later married Robert Russell), who in died intestate in 1765 leaving a son Hezekiah to succeed him. Then in 1770 Hezekiah White sold 50 acres at the west end to Thomas Hickman, and in his will 8 years later, Hezekiah said that Thomas Hickman was to get 25 acres more, and the residue was to be sold; later in the year his executor sold 50 acres to Ambrose Willett.

Simcock White was on a jury 3 different times: 1 Oct 1717, 6 Oct 1719 & 3 May 1720.6

Simcock estate was settled 13 Sep 1721 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ It was on this date that the inventory & appraisal of Simcock White was returned and signed by Mary [X] White. Appraiser: Thos. Evans, William [X] Nicolyion & Thomas Crippen Jnr. The estate sale and final settlement could not be readily located in the indexes in the Acc Co Clerk's Office. (NOTE: William [X] Nickelson also was an appraiser of the estate of Charles White, on 9 Oct 1721, who is assumed to have been a brother to Simcock White.) The parents of Simcock White are unproven. He is assumed to have been a son of William White II, planter, who had other unnamed children when he named only a son William in his verbal will of 1702. In 1713 Simcock White bought part of tract A121 which is White's Neck and was the location of named son William. Simcock not being shown in the Tithable List from 1663 to 1695 could be explained by the fact he would have been underage that he would have been listed with William White II. Since he was not shown on a headright list between 1663 & 1709, he was probably born in the colony.

Simcock White and Mary (----) had the following children:

Accomack Co, VA, at 49 years of age.1 It was on this date that an inventory & appraisal of Wixom White was taken by Daniel Hale, Thos. Crippen, Benjamin Hickman with Grace White as Admix. The estate was valued at £53.6.1. It was audited on 27 May 1760 and recorded on 24 Jun 1760. The widow's part was £13.6.2 and Hezekiah White, Ann White & Polly White each got £9.4.1 1/2. Since the estate seemed to be settled, it is unclear why on 26 Feb 1765 the estate of Wrixam White, unadministered by his widow Grace White, now deceased, was administered to Robert Russell. Solomon White was security. On this same date Southy Simpson, Charles Bagwell, Thomas Crippen & William White or any three of them being first sworn before a Justice of the Peace of this county to appraise in current money the slaves (if any) and personal estate of Wrixom White dec'd and make return thereof to the next court. The following were all paid the same amount, £12.10.4, for their part of Grace White's estate: Hezekiah White, Anne White, and Polly White.

On 30 Jan 1749 in Accomack Co, VA, Wrixom White and Daniel Hall were the securities on the administration of the estate of Joshua Hall to Martha Hall.6

Wrixom witnessed a will 2 Dec 1752 in Accomack Co, VA.7 It was on this date that Wrixom White, John Evans, William White and Robert Crippen witnessed the will of Paul Crippen. At probate the Crippens were called Quakers.

 - iii. Leah White8 was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1718. On 31 Jul 1739 in Accomack County Court, Solomon Baker, who had posted bond before Ralph Justice, now was charged "on oath" of fathering the "bastard child" born to Leah White, single woman. Ordered that Baker remain in the sheriff's custody till posting a £50:00:00 bond to save the parish the cost of supporting the child. Solomon and William Baker then each acknowledged they would owe £50:00:00 to the Accomack Parish church wardens (Richard Kitson and John Smith) if "the said Samuel Baker" (sic) did not support the child born to Leah White.9

She married **Simcock White** circa 1700 in Accomack Co, VA.² Simcock was born circa 1676 in Accomack Co, VA. Simcock ³ was the son of William White (II) Planter and Ann A. Bellow (----). Simcock died by 4 Apr 1721 in Accomack Co, VA, at 44 years of age.⁴ Simcock bought land 5 Sep 1713 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ It was on this date that Simcock White, wife Mary, bought 150 acres for 7,300 lbs tobacco of tract A121 west of the Baily land and between the two roads (sea side road and US Rt 13) from John [X] Wharton of Somerset County and his wife Susannah Wharton, who relinquished her dower rights on 6 Oct 1713. The deed showed it bounded land owned by Thomas Crippen, John Onions, Roger Miles & Samuel Church. It was witnessed by Jno. Johnson & Francis Wharton. When Simcock White died intestate in 1719 he was succeeded by a son Wrixham White (wife Grace who later married Robert Russell), who in died intestate in 1765 leaving a son Hezekiah to succeed him. Then in 1770 Hezekiah White sold 50 acres at the west end to Thomas Hickman, and in his will 8 years later, Hezekiah said that Thomas Hickman was to get 25 acres more, and the residue was to be sold; later in the year his executor sold 50 acres to Ambrose Willett.

Simcock White was on a jury 3 different times: 1 Oct 1717, 6 Oct 1719 & 3 May 1720.6

Simcock estate was settled 13 Sep 1721 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ It was on this date that the inventory & appraisal of Simcock White was returned and signed by Mary [X] White. Appraiser: Thos. Evans, William [X] Nicolyion & Thomas Crippen Jnr. The estate sale and final settlement could not be readily located in the indexes in the Acc Co Clerk's Office. (NOTE: William [X] Nickelson also was an appraiser of the estate of Charles White, on 9 Oct 1721, who is assumed to have been a brother to Simcock White.) (See Simcock White for the children resulting from this marriage.)

Mary was named as administrator of an estate 4 Apr 1721 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was on this date that Mary White, widow & relict of Simcock White dec'd petitioned the court for letters of administration on said estate of her husband dec'd and that he dying intestate... Garret Topping before 24 Sep 1771.¹ Garret was born circa 1745 in Accomack Co, VA.² He married Hannah Scarburgh (475) Rogers circa 1815.³ He married Scarburgh (217) Snead 22 Mar 1785 (bond) in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ Garret died 13 Sep 1817 at 72 years of age.⁵ Garret served in the Revolutionary War in 1776-1783.⁶ He was shown as Garret Topping, a Captain in the Militia. The pension application of Hannah Topping, widow of Garret Topping, showed she was a widow of Southey Simpson and also of Garett Topping, a Rev. Soldier.

Garret bought land 1784 in Onancock, Acc Co, VA.⁷ It was in this year that Lot No. 10 in Onancock was granted to Garret Topping.

Garret bought land 1792 in Slutkill Neck, Acc Co, VA.⁸ It was in this year that Garret Topping bought 150 acres (part of Whitelaw's tract A54) from Bennett & George Scarburgh, who left 75 acres each to his sons John S. and Nathaniel S., the later to get "the mannor part of my plantation." The house (Whitelaw's A54E) was known both as the Topping Place and the Dahl's Swamp House. The quaint little house stands well back in the swamp, and it must have been built by Garret Topping soon after his purchase in 1792.

Garret sold land 1793 in Onancock, Acc Co, VA.⁹ It was in this year that Garret Topping and his wife Scarburgh Topping deeded Lot No. 10 in Onancock to John Simpson, who deeded it back the next year.

Garret was listed as a head of household in the census of 1800 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹⁰ He was shown as Garriot Topping, a head of household, aged over 45. Listed with him were 3 males age 0-10; 2 females, age 0-10; 1 female, age 10-16; 1 female, age 16-26; 1 female 26-45; and 8 slaves.

Garret was listed as a head of household in the census of 1810 in St. George Parish, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ He was shown as Garrett Topping, a head of household, age over 45 years. Listed with him were 1 male, age 0-10; 2 males, age 10-16; 1 male, age 16-26; 1 female, age 10-16; 1 female, age 26-45; 1 female, age over 45; and 8 slaves.

He made a will 22 Apr 1812 in Accomack Co, VA. 12 To son Nathaniel S. Topping the plantation where I now live containing 75 acres & Negro man Obadiah. To son John S. Topping the remainder of my land adjoining Teackle & Scarburgh lands. If either son dies under age 21 or without issue, then to son Littleton T. Topping & also to Littleton my Negro man Elijah & ½ of boy Levin. To son William R. Topping Negro boy Caleb & ½ my Negro boy Levin. To daughter Nancy T. Topping Negro girl Anney & ½ of Negro girl Betty. To daughter Zipporah T. Topping Negro girl lbby & ½ of girl Betty & old Comfort. Thomas Snead & son Nathaniel S. Topping Extrs. Witt: Charles Snead, Tully Snead & Sarah Snead. According to Whitelaw, in 1812 Garret Topping's widow Anne Topping

exchanged Lot No. 10 in Onancock for land elsewhere with Patience Laylor and Elizabeth Jacob, and 2 years later Levin and Patience Laylor sold their interest to James Ashmead, who had married Elizabeth Jacob. The deed stated it was the lot "whereon the tavern is now kept," so if it happend to have been at the east end fo the lot, it would have been approximately where Taylor's Inn is now operated (1953). (NOTE: Whitelaw must have been mistaken on this Anne Topping being Garret's widow, as Garret was found about 5 years later freeing a slave. The deed showed that she was exchanging her dower rights, but it did not show her as a widow of Garret Topping.)1

Appraised by Rich'd Kitson, Thomas Crippen & John Barnes Senior. The inventory was sworn to in open court of Accomack County by Annabellow White and ordered recorded on 3 May 1709. On 8 Nov 1699 in Accomack Court it was noted that at the last court Richard Rogers had been appointed constable to replace Michael Rickets, but now Mr. Robert Hutchinson "moved ye court that ye said Rogers was a person illiterate and therefore not capable to manage an office of so considerable a trust." Hutchinson recommended William White, who lived in the precinct and was "more fit to manage ye trust in regard he could write and read." The court ordered that Rogers be discharged and that White go to the nearest magistrate to be sworn.

William witnessed a will 3 Feb 1700 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ It was on this date that William White, Christopher Havs and Thomas Jenkinson witnessed the will of James Cuddy, wife Jane.

On 18 May 1682 in Accomack Court, depostion of William White Jr., aged about 18 years: Last March when White was looking for some animals near the field at Craddock belonging to Mr. Thomas Teakle, Phillip and John Lecat Jr., came and asked him to help look for their mother's horse. White went with them into Matchetan's Neck, which belonged to Widow Huit; they met Joseph Milby, George Russell and Thomas Jenkins and found the horse in with a group of mares belonging to Thomas Hall. They tried to catch the horses, and as they tried, John Milby's dog followed along, barking until they drove the horses into the creek, at which time Joseph Milby "checked the said dog and brought him off. And then the horses rund by us and dog run after them again." When the horses ran over the gut, the dog stayed behind until the dogs with David Davinson started barking at the horses. The barking dogs followed the horses till they were out of sight; White, Milby, George Russell and Thomas Jenkins went around the head of the gut and met David Davinson on the other side. Russell, Jenkins and John Lecat Jr., crossed Widow Huitt's Plantation; Phillip Lecat, Milby, David and White stayed behind to catch Milby's mother's horse. They found the horses again in the point field, but White did not see any dogs; when the horses were driven down the branch, the dogs met them again. A little later Milby said that they had gotten one down. He called to David and said that a horse was dead. David replied, "Your dog hath killed it." Joseph said, "I have but one dog." White saw some blood on the water. Signed and sworn in open court on 18 May 1682, by William White.¹

William appears on the list of tithables in Accomack Co, VA for 1694.² Wm. White Jr. was in Mr. Bally precinct with 2 tithables. This was his first time on the list (at least shown as Wm. White Jr.). There was a Hen. White, with 1 tithable, next to him. There is also a Wm. Wale, with 1 tithable, in the same precinct. In the next year, 1695, he was again listed as Wm. White Jr. with 1 tithable but this time he was next to Chas. White, who was in Mr. Bally precinct with 1 tithable for the first time.

iii. Charles White (I)² was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1674.³ Since he was first on the tithable list in 1695 he would have just turned 21. Charles was named as the executor of a will 19 Jan 1720/1 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ Charles White and Thomas Riley were named to be overseers of my children and their estates in the will of Francis Avres.

Charles estate was settled 9 Oct 1721 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² It was on this date that the inventory and appraisal of Charles White was recorded. Appraisers: John [X] Melson, John [X] Hickmand & William [X] Nickelson.

William sold land 15 Sep 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ It was on this date that for 4,500 lbs tobacco, William White Sr., planter, sold Rowland Savage 175 acres at the head of Pocomoak Branch. Signed 15 Sep 1691 by William [X] White. Witt: Thomas Welburn and Jno. Washbourne.

On 8 Nov 1699 in Accomack Court it was noted that at the last court Richard Rogers had been appointed constable to replace Michael Rickets, but now Mr. Robert Hutchinson "moved ye court that ye said Rogers was a person illiterate and therefore not capable to manage an office of so considerable a trust." Hutchinson recommended William White, who lived in the precinct and was "more fit to manage ye trust in regard he could write and read." The court ordered that Rogers be discharged and that White go to the nearest magistrate to be sworn.⁷

William witnessed a will 3 Feb 1700 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was on this date that William White, Christopher Hays and Thomas Jenkinson witnessed the will of James Cuddy, wife Jane.

The nuncupative will of William White dec'd was presented to the court 3 Aug 1703 by his son William White who prayed probation thereof which being proved in open court of Accomack County by corporal oaths of Peter Rogers and Richard Rogers is ordered to be recorded. He married **Elizabeth Abbott** circa 1705 in Accomack Co, VA.² Elizabeth was born circa 1685 in Accomack Co, VA.³ Elizabeth ⁴ was the daughter of John Abbott Jr. and Amy Mason.

George was living 23 May 1731 in Accomack Co, VA.5 George's will was probated 23 Feb 1764 in Accomack Co, VA.6 George Bundick's birth year is estimated from the fact he had married by 2 April 1706. On that date, John Abbott Senr, of Acc Co, planter, gave to his daughter, Elizabeth Bundick, "now wife of George Bundick" 100 acres "on ye south side of Back Creek Branch wch was given to me by my father John Abbott in 1688" (Acc Co Wills &c., 1692-1715, part 2, p. 188). On 4 Feb 1718, George Bundick bought 100 adjoining acres from John Abbott of Somerset County, in the province of Maryland. son and heir of Robert Abbott, deceased (Acc Co Deeds, Wills &c., 1715-1729, part 1, p. 99). George Bundick then owned 200 acres of land in the area of present-day Parksley (Whitelaw, p. 1120), before his father died in 1731, leaving him 200 acres in Parkers Neck and about 100 acres near Guilford Creek. On 28 Jan 1755, George Bundick and wife Elizabeth deeded the latter, as 100 acres, here called Robins Hole Swamp, for 20 pounds, to John Abbott Bundick (their son) and to Richard Bundick (their grandson) (Acc Co Deeds, 1746- 1757, p. 543). George Bundick, like his father and grandfather, lived to be an old man. His son and namesake had died 13 years before he made his will on 28 Jun 1763. It was recorded on 23 Feb 1764. He left son John Abbott Bundick the 200 acres "on the seaside where I now live" and made him executor. He gave grandson Richard Bundick (son of his deceased son, George Bundick Junr) 200 acres "where he now lives provided he let his mother, Tabitha Bundick, have a guiet & peaceable living during her widowhood." George Bundick's wife had apparently predeceased him, as she was not named in his will. Two daughters were also deceased. He divided personal property between his son, his grandson, Leah Townsend, daughter of Henry Townsend, daughters Susanna Sturgis and Rachel Satchell, and granddaughters Elizabeth Stephens and Betty Turnell. He did not own slaves (Acc Co Wills, 1761-1767, p. 244). A complete transcription of the will of George Bundick follows - In the name of God Amen, I, George Bundick of Accomack County being in good health of body and of sound and perfect mind and memory thanks be to God Almighty for the same, but considering the uncertainty of this life do make and appoint this my Last Will and Testament revoking all other Will or Wills do make and appoint this my last. [Item] I give and bequeath to my son John Abbot Bundick and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten forever my land whereon I now dwell on Seaside containing two hundred acres more or less and my large table and bench belonging to it one large iron pot with the lays(?) much bunt(?) with the pot hooks and pot rack belonging to it one old horse & mare and all my cedar casks in and my will is that my son John Abbot Bundick pay unto my grandson Richard Bundick the sum of fifteen pounds in cash and if in case my son John Abbot Bundick should fail payment of the said sum of fifteen pounds as aforesaid unto my grandson Richard Bundick or heirs, he shall forfeit all that I have before given to my said grandson Richard Bundick and his heirs forever. [Item] I give unto my grandson Richard Bundick and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten forever two hundred acres of land whereon he now lives provided that he lets his mother Tabitha Bundick have a quiet and peaceable living during her widowhood. I also give unto my grandson Richard Bundick one square table and one hand mill & one grindstone. [Item] I give to Sarah Townsend the daughter of Henry Townsend one feather bed and furniture one pine chest with a lock & key belonging to it. [Item] My will is that all the remainder of my estate not before given to be divided equally between my two daughters Susanna Sturgis (and) Rachel Satchel and my granddaughters Elizabeth Stephens & Betty Turnell. Lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my son John Abbot Bundick my whole and sole executor of this my Last Will and Testament to see to same performed according to the true intent and meaning of the same. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affix my seal this twenty eight day of June MDCCSIII(?) (His initials) G.B. (and seal). Signed sealed and acknowledged in presence of William East, Archibald Barns, Charles Gill. At a Court held for Accomack County February 23 1764, the within Last Will & Testament of George Bundick deceased was presented & proved by the oaths of Archibald Barnes and Charles Gill two of the

witnesses thereto and admitted to record and on the motion of John Abbot Bundick the Executor therein named taking oath and giving John Walker & Isaac Melson(?) for his securities who entered into and acknowledged a bond for that purpose, Certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form (Acc Co Wills, 1761-1767, p. 244).

George Bundick and Elizabeth Abbott had the following children:

i. George⁵ Bundick Jr.¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1710. George died 1751 at 41 years of age.² He married Tabitha (-----) circa 1732.³ Tabitha was born circa 1710.

George's will was probated 30 Jul 1751 in Accomack Co. VA.⁴ George Bundick Jr. inherited no land, for he died before his father. He apparently lived on his father's land, in an area that became the present-day Parksley, for this was where his widow and son were living when his father died in 1764. In his will, written 14 Apr 1751, George Bundick Jr. named a son Richard and daughters Ann and Elizabeth Bundick. He left personal property to son Richard Bundick and to daughters Ann Bundick and Elizabeth Bundick. A wife was mentioned, but not by name. Wife to have use of personal estate during her widowhood, then to be divided between children. Wife and son Richard to be executors. Witnesses were Henry Satchell, Richard Onions, and John Abbott Bundick. A complete transcription of the will of George Bundick Jr. follows - In the name of God Amen. I George Bundick Junr. of Accomack County being very sick and weak but of sound and perfect mind & memory thanks be to Almighty God for the same but considering with my the uncertainty of this life do make constitute and appoint this my Last Will and Testament. That is to say First I bequeath my Soul to Almighty God who gave it hoping that though the ___ and I opion of my blessed Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to ordain everlasting salvation and as for such worldly goods and estate as God of his Money and oppourtunity hath been pleased to help me with I give and dispose thereof as follows [ITEM] I give and bequeath to my son Richard Bundick one young horse that was his and one feather bed and furniture that the __ _ belongs to and one oval table with __ and one that he hath in his possession and one large pewter dish and two small ones and six pewter and one large pewter bason and pewter P of my last large iron pot and one cow and calf and _ __. Also I give to my son Richard Bundick clothes and trnning that I have in the house to make him & and my pistol holusters and sowrd and all my wearing clothes and my saddle that I bought of [ITEM] I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann Bundick my best trimble bedsted and furniture belonging to it and the most best pewter dish and half dozen pewter plates and one pewter bason & inger and the next best iron pot and my rodest oak table and my largest ___ and my riding saddle and one cow and calf and two . [ITEM] I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Bundick one small trundle bestead and furniture and by blackest oak table and these the most largest pewter dishes and six petwer plates and by best pewter bason largest one and one pewter ingor and my most best iron pot and one cow and calf and Ewe and one desk & small trunk that is in it. [ITEM] I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann Bundick on poplar chest. [ITEM] My will is that my loving wife shall have the use of the remainder of my estate dudring her widowhood and that the day of her death or marriage to be equally divided amongst my children. Lastly I do constitute and appoint my and loving wife and my son Richard Bundick my whole and sole executors of this my Last Will and Testament to be the same performed according

 - iii. Elizabeth Bundick¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1715. Elizabeth died before 1763.² She married Christopher Stevens circa 1750.³ Christopher was born circa 1730. Christopher died 1751 at 21 years of age.⁴ Christopher's will was probated 26 Nov 1751 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵

Elizabeth was named in her uncle's will 30 Dec 1718 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ She was shown as my goddaughter Elizabeth Bundick and given all that is in the hands of George Bundick in the will of John Abbott.

Elizabeth was living 26 Nov 1751 in Accomack Co, VA.7

iv. John Abbott Bundick Sr.⁸ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1720. John died 1784 at 63 years of age.⁹ He married twice. He married Elizabeth Satchell circa 1745.¹⁰ Elizabeth was born circa 1726 in Accomack Co, VA. Elizabeth ¹¹ was the daughter of Henry Satchell and Elizabeth Ansil. Elizabeth was living 21 Mar 1746/7 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² He married Bridget (-----) circa 1760.¹³ Bridget was born circa 1740. She married William Nock 30 Nov 1784 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ Bridget was living 13 Jul 1780 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁵

John was living 28 Jun 1763 in Accomack Co, VA. ¹⁶ John was paid for public service during Rev. 1781-1783 in Accomack Co, VA. ¹⁷ He was shown as John Bundick Sr. on a list found in the Archives of the Virginia State Library of Accomack County people who were paid for public service from 1781 to 1783.

John's will was probated 30 Mar 1784 in Accomack Co, VA. 18 John Abbott Bundick Sr, who was named for his maternal grandfather, inherited 200 acres from his father George in 1764, "on the seaside where I now live." This tract was in the northern part of Parkers Neck, part of the first Richard Bundick patent of 1664, the 200 acres he gave his son Richard in 1677 and that Richard (II) left son George in 1731. John Abbott Bundick and his nephew, Richard Bundick, had been given the 100 acres called Robins Hole Swamp by his parents in 1755. John Abbott Bundick sold no land in his lifetime, except for 200 acres his son, John Abbott Bundick Junr (with wife Nancy and mother-in-law Mary Dix), deeded him on 22 Feb 1779 (Acc Co Deeds, 1777-1783, p. 113), land that he deeded back to his son the next day (Acc Co Deeds, 1777- 1783, p. 127). This was evidently a transaction to clear the title to the land. John Abbott Bundick made his will on 13 Jul 1780 and it was

recorded 30 Mar 1784. His will was a long one. He left his home plantation of 200 acres to his son George Bundick. He left his swamp land and marsh to sons John Abbott Bundick and William Bundick (unmarried). He left his wife Bridget household furniture, "200 weight of meat" and livestock. He left furniture to other of his children, but son George seems to have inherited most of his personal property including livestock, a still and "1/3 my fishing boat." Negroes were to be divided "equally amongst all my children." He also named a grandson as John Bundick, son of George (Acc Co Wills, 1780-1784, p. 480). John Abbott Bundick's residual estate was divided among his heirs on 25 Nov 1785. As his widow, Bridget received 1/3, amounting to 104 pounds 14 shillings 1 1/4 pence. Sons John Bundick and William Bundick received a like amount, as did Thomas Lillaston. Parker Barnes, Archibald Barnes, and Richard Hickman. These four men had married John Abbott Bundick's four daughters. Son George Bundick was not named in this division (Acc Co Wills, 1784-1787, p. 269). An item of interest is that on 1 May 1783, the Acc Co Court made a list of persons who had supplied Revolutionary War forces or persons "Impressed for Continental Purposes." Among those listed are John A. Bundick Senr "for carting 25 bushels oats 17 miles" at a cost of 7 shillings 1 pence and John A. Bundick Junr for 150 bushels fodder at 4 shillings 4 pence (Acc Co Orders, 1780-1783, pp. 529 & 531). A complete transcription of the will of John Abbott Bundick Senr follows - In the name of God Amen, I, John Abbott Bundick of the County of Accomack being in good health of body and of sound and perfect memory I ordain this to be my last Will and Testament revoking all other Wills. I give and bequeath my soul to God who gave it and my body to the earth from whence it came and to be buried at the discretion of my Executors & Administrators. [Item] I give unto my wife Bridget Bundick my wife one feather bed and furniture stead mat and cord and one bed quilt and my blue curtains she is to have her choice of my beds and also one chest also one iron pot herchoice and three chairs also one linen wheel and a pair of flat irons also a safe at her mother and one large pewter dish and basin and six plates and one side saddle also one of my horse kind and one cow and calf her choice and five barrels of corn also four hogs and two ewes and lambs also a tea kettle I also lend my wife my riding chair as long as she is my widow and if she gets a chair then mine returns to my Estate. [Item] I give to my wife two hundred gallon casks and two hundred weight of meat also my largest oval table. [Item] I give to my son George bundick my plantation whereon I now live containing two hundred acres of land with all houses orchards and all other appurtenances thereunto belonging, I give the said two hundred acres of land to him and his heirs forever. [Item] I give to my son George Bundick my new corner cupboard and one case of bottles and my great square table and my grindstone and one cow and calf and two ewes and one heifer and one third of my fishing boat and one large pewterbasin and one pewter dish and five hundred gallons casks and my still only my will is that my wife still have the use of it as long as she remains my widow. [Item] I give my son John Abbott bundick my swamp land and marsh to be equally divided between my son John and my son William Bundick to them and their heirs forever. [Item] I give to my son John my new chest of drawers. [Item] I give to my daughter Anne my old chest of drawers. [Item] I give to my daughter Santer my next biggest oval table. [Item] I give to my daughter Shady the next biggest oval table. [Item] I give to my daughter Leah my tea table. [Item] I give to my son William Bundick one horse called prance and saddle also one feather bed and furniture bedstead mat and cord also two pewter dishes two pewter basins and six spoons and three chairs and one gun and one chest also six plates also one iron pot and hooks one ax one hoe and one cow and calf and two ewes and lambs and one sow and pigs also one case of bottles and my desk and sixty pounds in hard cash. [Item] I give to my son George two silver spoons and my spy glass also ten pounds in hard cash. [Item] I give to my son John 30 pounds in hard cash. Now mind all the legacies I left my

son William I shall let him have when he marry's except the three last. [Item] I give my son George liberty to get timber off my swamp land for his own use and his son John the same liberty (during) their life time. [Item] I give my son George my hand mill and four earthen plates and one dish. [Item] I give to my three sons all my wearing apparel. [Item] I give all my negroes to be divided equally amongst all my children. Now I give all the remainder of my Estate to be divided between my wife Bridget and my daughter Ann and daughter Santer and my daughter Shady and my son John and my daughter Leah and my son William; Now I hereby appoint my wife Bridget Bundick and my three sons George and John and William to by my whole and sole Executors and Executrix of this my last will and Testament, I do utterly revoke and disallow all and every other former Wills and Testaments by me in any ways before this time named Willed and bequeath ratifying this & no other to be my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 13th day of July 1780. (Signed) John Abbott Bundick. (Witnesses:) Spencer Barnes, Jacob Sturgis, John Barnes. At a Court held in Accomack County (on) March 30th 1784, this will was proved by the oath of John Barnes and Spencer Barnes witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded and on the motion of John Abbott Bundick of William Bundick taking oath and giving William Parramore and John Custis for their securities (Acc Co Wills, 1780-1784, p. 480).

v. Susanna Bundick¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1722. She married (----) Sturgis circa 1750.² (----) was born circa 1730.

Susanna was living 28 Jun 1763 in Accomack Co, VA.3

vi. Rachel Bundick⁴ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1724. She married Henry Satchell circa 1745.⁵ Henry was born circa 1722 in Accomack Co, VA. Henry ⁶ was the son of Henry Satchell and Elizabeth Ansil. Henry died 1779 at 57 years of age.⁷ Henry was living 21 Mar 1746/7 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ Henry's will was probated 27 Jan 1779 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹

Rachel was living 28 Jun 1763 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰

vii. (2d|o Geo.) Bundick¹¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1730. (2d|o died before 1763.¹² She married Henry Townsend circa 1750.¹³ Henry was born circa 1730.

109. **Elizabeth⁶ Abbott** (John⁷, John⁸)¹⁴ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1685.¹⁵ She must have been of age in Nov 1709 when her father, John Abbott's estate was settled, as only John & William Abbott had guardians named.

She married **George Bundick** circa 1705 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁶ George was born circa 1680 in Accomack Co, VA. George ¹⁷ was the son of Richard Bundick (II). George died 1764 at 83 years of age.¹⁸ George was living 23 May 1731 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁹ George's will was probated 23 Feb 1764 in

110. **William** White (I) Wheelwright was born circa 1615. William died by 21 Feb 1682 in Accomack Co, VA, at 66 years of age.¹ It was on this date that administration on the estate William White was granted to Elizabeth White, widow of said William. Elizabeth White, widow of William White, was granted administration of the estate after she put in security. Ordered that George Hope, Isaac Dix, John Sturgis and John Barnes go to the nearest magistrate to be sworn and that they appraise and inventory the estate of William White.

He married twice. He married Mary (----) circa 1640.2 Mary was born circa 1620. On 16 Jul 1663 in Accomack Court, Murrin Cornelius had repeated several "speeches" disparaging the wife of Robert Huit. Cornelius confessed and said she had heard them from Mary White, but could not prove it. Cornelius was ordered to make her contrition by acknowledgement in court and in both Occahannock Church and Nanda Church. She was to pay court costs. Deposition of Hugh Cornelius and Marrion his wife on 16 July 1663: About a year ago Mary White related that Richard Hill's barrow got into Undimon's field, where Huitt kiled it and with his men carried it home. When the hog was dressed, the say Richard Hill's daughter coming to the house, so they cut off the hog's head and ran into a little room with it. As Capt. Baker and Hill were at Huitt's house the next Sabbath, they were invited to stay to dinner. Hill asked if that was part of the same poor sow that Huitt had sent Hill's wife a piece of. Mary White also related that Huitt had killed only one poor sow that year. She added that Robert Huitt's wife sent for her and asked what her nephew had said about her. Mary White told what had been related. Huitt's wife said that if Mary had told her in private, she would have liked Mary well, but now Richard Hill and everyone would hear it. Signed: Hugh [X] Cornelius and Marrion [backward 3] Cornelius. John Lecatt, Charles Ratcliff, Hugh Turpin & Isaac Dix also gave depositions. On 18 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, it was ordered that the suit brought against Mary White by Hugh Cornelius be dropped for lack of cause, with Conrelius paying court costs. It was ordered that Mary White, who "scandalized and abused" Goody Huit, her aunt, be committed into the sheriff's custody until she asked her aunt's forgiveness three times: once in open court, once before the congregation of each church in the county on succeeding Sabbath days. Mary White was to pay court costs. Deposition of Marrion Cornelius, aged about 25 years, 18 Aug 1663: Mary White told her ther Mary's Aunt Goody Huitt, while in England, stole a gown, a hood, and a scarf, and if she had not hastened out of England, she would have been stopped. Also she stole the doctor's instruments aboard the ship she came in and put them in Mary White's box in case she ship's master found it out. Signed: Marrion [O over arc] Cornelius.3

He married **Elizabeth (----)** circa 1680 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ Elizabeth was born circa 1655. She married **Thomas Crippen** by 2 Jul 1683 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ Elizabeth was named as administrator of an estate 21 Feb 1682 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ It was on this date that the estate of William White was administered to Elizabeth White, widow of said William. Elizabeth White, widow of William White, was granted administration of the estate after she put in security. Ordered that George Hope, Isaac Dix, John Sturgis and John Barnes go to the nearest magistrate to be sworn and that they appraise and inventory the estate of William White.

At an Accomack County Court on 18 Dec 1682 Elizabeth Man petitioned the court saying that she had served her term of service to William White (deceased) and others; she requested that Elizabeth, White's widow, pay her corn and clothes according to the custom of the country. Since White had been

her last master, it was ordered that Elizabeth White pay the corn, clothes and court costs.1

William appears on the list of tithables in Accomack Co, VA for 1663-1682.² There was a Wm. White on the tithable list from its beginning in 1663 up until his death in 1682. He was listed next to Robert Huitt in 1663. He was shown as a wheelwright in 1667 and in 1679. He had only 1 tithable from 1663 thru 1675 and he had 3 tithables in 1676, 1677 & 1678. In 1679 he went down to 2, but back up to 4 in 1680 and then 3 in 1681 & 1682. 1675 was the first year there were 2 Wm. Whites on the list, the second one is assumed to have been his son William White.

On 16 Jul 1663 in a deposition William White said he had lived in this country several years and had never heard ill reports of Robert Huitt and his wife till this rumor was spread. Siged: William [M] White.³

On 17 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, William Browne denied that he committed fornication with Norah, but she swore that he was father of her child, so it was ordered that Browne be fined 500 lbs tobacco, post bond for the child's support, be committed to the sheriff's custody till he post bond for good behavior, and pay court costs. Norath (sic) confessed the sin of fornication, but asked to be released from corporal punishment by paying a fine. As William White promised to pay 400 lbs tobacco for Norah, she was acquited from the punishment, but was to pay 100 lbs tobacco herself, with court costs.⁴

On 18 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, deposition of Dority Watts aged about 28 years, 18 Aug 1663: Said that last November when she came to William White's house late at night, both William and his wife asked her to stay all night. She accepted, and after a short time she heard White's wife say that her aunt stole a hood and a scarf in England, and if she had not left when shd did, she would have been stopped. Mrs. White also said that her aunt stole a doctor's case of instruments. Signed: Dority [D] Watts.⁵

William was named as a headright 17 Nov 1664 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ It was on this date that Wm. White was on a headright list for Robert Pitt.

On 18 Dec 1666 William White was granted a certificate for 400 acres for transporting 8 people into the colony.⁷

William patented land 1667 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was in this year that a patent was granted to William White for 400 acres and 2 years later he and his wife Mary assigned to Arthur Robins, who reassigned to Teage Anderson.

He served on a jury 16 Jun 1673 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ It was on this date that Wm. White, planter, and Wm. White were both members of the same jury, and the next day Wm. White, wheelwright was on a jury and the foreman was Ambrose White. On 19 Aug 1673 Wm. White, wheelwright, and Wm. White, planter, were both on the same jury whose foreman was Ambrose White.

On 17 Jun 1673 Teige Anderson sold land to William Willett and George Middleton 400 acres on Hunting Creek once owned by William White.¹⁰

William bought land 19 May 1674 in Pungoteague, Acc Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that George Parker and his wife Florence, for 5,454 lbs of tobacco, sold to William White, wheelwright, 374 acres at Pengeteag on the south side of Pocomoke Creek bounded by land formerly owned by John Williams, Nicholas Wadelow and Anthony Johnson, Negro. Signed: 19 Mar 1673/4, George [G] Parker and Florence Parker ... George Parker, gentleman, and his wife Florence appointed Robert Watson, Sr., as their attorney to handle the sale of property to William White, wheelwright. This branch of the White family is laid out in Whitelaw, p. 1142 in descirbing the ownership of tract A121. Today the neck is called White's Neck, the creek on the south in Bundick's Creek and the creek on the north is White's Creek. In 1683 William White, wife Elizabeth, died intestate and was succeeded by a son William [II]. Elizabeth married Thomas Crippen. In 1703 the verbal will of William White [II] left everthing to his son William [III], who in 1767, wife Mary, left 400 acres at the south side to his son William [IV] and 200 acres on the north side to

In 1797 William [IV] left his land to his sons Arthur, William, George, James and John; and the last named sold his part to his brother George and a survey 6 years later showed 421 acres for division. In 1778 George White (son of William III) and his wife Agnes left to an unborn child, if any, otherwise to a nephew George White Burton and in 1804 George W. & Helen Burton sold as 150 acres to John Burton Sr. (NOTE: Whitelaw may have skipped a generation between William II and III.)

William White (I) Wheelwright and Mary (-----) had the following child:

+ 80 i. William⁶ White (II) Planter was born circa 1640 and died by 3 Aug 1703.

111. **Mary**⁷ (-----) was born circa 1620.

She married **William White (I) Wheelwright** circa 1640.¹ William was born circa 1615. He married **Elizabeth (----)** circa 1680 in Accomack Co, VA.² William died by 21 Feb 1682 in Accomack Co, VA, at 66 years of age.³ William appears on the list of tithables in Accomack Co, VA for 1663-1682.⁴ There was a Wm. White on the tithable list from its beginning in 1663 up until his death in 1682. He was listed next to Robert Huitt in 1663. He was shown as a wheelwright in 1667 and in 1679. He had only 1 tithable from 1663 thru 1675 and he had 3 tithables in 1676, 1677 & 1678. In 1679 he went down to 2, but back up to 4 in 1680 and then 3 in 1681 & 1682. 1675 was the first year there were 2 Wm. Whites on the list, the second one is assumed to have been his son William White.

On 16 Jul 1663 in a deposition William White said he had lived in this country several years and had never heard ill reports of Robert Huitt and his wife till this rumor was spread. Siged: William [M] White.⁵

On 17 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, William Browne denied that he committed fornication with Norah, but she swore that he was father of her child, so it was ordered that Browne be fined 500 lbs tobacco, post bond for the child's support, be committed to the sheriff's custody till he post bond for good behavior, and pay court costs. Norath (sic) confessed the sin of fornication, but asked to be released from corporal punishment by paying a fine. As William White promised to pay 400 lbs tobacco for Norah, she was acquited from the punishment, but was to pay 100 lbs tobacco herself, with court costs.⁶

On 18 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, deposition of Dority Watts aged about 28 years, 18 Aug 1663: Said that last November when she came to William White's house late at night, both William and his wife asked her to stay all night. She accepted, and after a short time she heard White's wife say that her aunt stole a hood and a scarf in England, and if she had not left when shd did, she would have been stopped. Mrs. White also said that her aunt stole a doctor's case of instruments. Signed: Dority [D] Watts.⁷

William was named as a headright 17 Nov 1664 in Accomack Co, VA.⁸ It was on this date that Wm. White was on a headright list for Robert Pitt.

On 18 Dec 1666 William White was granted a certificate for 400 acres for transporting 8 people into the colony.9

William patented land 1667 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ It was in this year that a patent was granted to William White for 400 acres and 2 years later he and his wife Mary assigned to Arthur Robins, who reassigned to Teage Anderson.

He served on a jury 16 Jun 1673 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that Wm. White, planter, and Wm. White were both members of the same jury, and the next day Wm. White, wheelwright was on a jury and the foreman was Ambrose White. On 19 Aug 1673 Wm. White, wheelwright, and Wm. White, planter, were both on the same jury whose foreman was Ambrose White.

On 17 Jun 1673 Teige Anderson sold land to William Willett and George Middleton 400 acres on

Hunting Creek once owned by William White.1

William bought land 19 May 1674 in Pungoteague, Acc Co, VA.² It was on this date that George Parker and his wife Florence, for 5,454 lbs of tobacco, sold to William White, wheelwright, 374 acres at Pengeteag on the south side of Pocomoke Creek bounded by land formerly owned by John Williams, Nicholas Wadelow and Anthony Johnson, Negro. Signed: 19 Mar 1673/4, George [G] Parker and Florence Parker ... George Parker, gentleman, and his wife Florence appointed Robert Watson, Sr., as their attorney to handle the sale of property to William White, wheelwright. (See William White (I) Wheelwright for the children resulting from this marriage.)

On 16 Jul 1663 in Accomack Court, Murrin Cornelius had repeated several "speeches" disparaging the wife of Robert Huit. Cornelius confessed and said she had heard them from Mary White, but could not prove it. Cornelius was ordered to make her contrition by acknowledgement in court and in both Occahannock Church and Nanda Church. She was to pay court costs. Deposition of Hugh Cornelius and Marrion his wife on 16 July 1663: About a year ago Mary White related that Richard Hill's barrow got into Undimon's field, where Huitt kiled it and with his men carried it home. When the hog was dressed, the say Richard Hill's daughter coming to the house, so they cut off the hog's head and ran into a little room with it. As Capt. Baker and Hill were at Huitt's house the next Sabbath, they were invited to stay to dinner. Hill asked if that was part of the same poor sow that Huitt had sent Hill's wife a piece of. Mary White also related that Huitt had killed only one poor sow that year. She added that Robert Huitt's wife sent for her and asked what her nephew had said about her. Mary White told what had been related. Huitt's wife said that if Mary had told her in private, she would have liked Mary well, but now Richard Hill and everyone would hear it. Signed: Hugh [X] Cornelius and Marrion [backward 3] Cornelius. John Lecatt, Charles Ratcliff, Hugh Turpin & Isaac Dix also gave depositions. On 18 Aug 1663 in Accomack Court, it was ordered that the suit brought against Mary White by Hugh Cornelius be dropped for lack of cause, with Conrelius paying court costs. It was ordered that Mary White, who "scandalized and abused" Goody Huit, her aunt, be committed into the sheriff's custody until she asked her aunt's forgiveness three times; once in open court, once before the congregation of each church in the county on succeeding Sabbath days. Mary White was to pay court costs. Deposition of Marrion Cornelius, aged about 25 years, 18 Aug 1663: Mary White told her ther Mary's Aunt Goody Huitt, while in England, stole a gown, a hood, and a scarf, and if she had not hastened out of England, she would have been stopped. Also she stole the doctor's instruments aboard the ship she came in and put them in Mary White's box in case she ship's master found it out. Signed: Marrion [O over arc] Cornelius.3

112. **Capt. Robert⁷ Snead** was born circa 1650. Robert died by 4 Mar 1712/3 in Accomack Co, VA, at 62 years of age.⁴

He married twice. He married **Elizabeth Lucas** circa 1675 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ Elizabeth was born circa 1650. To eldest son John and son Benony land at Deep Creek; should both die without issue Benony's part to go to Alexander's eldest son and John's part to my son Jonathan. John's will was probated 4 Aug 1703 in Accomack Co, VA.² John West was baptisted on 13 Apr 1638 in England (Some Descendants of Anthony West of Acc, VA). John West deposed 10 Nov 1663 that he was aged 25 years or thereabouts. On 23 Dec 1650 he had been put in possession of 1600 acres in Northampton County which included the Herle tract. He was a carpenter and shipbuilder by trade and served Accomack County as commissioner, 1662-63, justice, 1663-1703, sheriff, 1667, and as captain, major and lieutenant colonel of militia, 1655-1703. He held 5250 acres in Accomack County, 1683. A patent issued to John West, 20 Oct 1661, for 250 acres in Northampton County recites that the land was granted to Matilda Scarburgh, 31 Mar 1655, and due said West as marrying with the said Scarburgh. His widow held 3600 acres in Accomack County, 1704 (Adventurers of Purse and Person, p. 663). For more on the descendants of Lt. Col. xii. Mary (15) West⁸ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1685.⁹ She deposed on 2 Oct 1766 that she was aged 80 and upwards. Mary died Jan 1767 at 81 years of age.¹⁰ She married twice. She married Capt. Robert Snead circa 1705.¹¹ Robert was born circa 1650. He married Elizabeth Lucas circa 1675 in Accomack Co, VA.¹² Robert died by 4 Mar 1712/3 in Accomack Co, VA, at 62 years of age.¹³ She married William Burton circa 1715 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁴ Mary West was William Burton's 2nd wife.

140 xiv. Scarburgh (17) West³ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1688. She married Thomas Harding 27 Dec 1705.⁴ They moved to the Pamlico region of North Carolina where he was referred to as a ship carpenter of Bath County and as a mariner and was provost marshal of Bath County.

Thomas was born circa 1680. Thomas died by Oct 1727 in Bath Co, NC, at 47 years of age.⁵

Scarburgh was named in her father's will 6 Feb 1702/03 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ She was under age 16.

141. **Matilda [13]**⁷ **Scarburgh** (Col. Edmund [3]⁸)⁷ was born in Accomack Co, VA 1645.⁸ She deposed 17 Mar 1679/80 that she was age 35. Matilda died 3 Jan 1720/21 in Accomack Co, VA, at 75 years of age.⁹

She married **Lt. Col. John (2) West** circa 1658 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ John was born 7 Apr 1638 in Worchester, England.¹¹ John ¹² was the son of Anthony (1) West and Anne (----). John died 27 May 1703 in Nandua, Acc Co, VA, at 65 years of age.¹³ John was living 12 Oct 1651.¹⁴ John was living circa 1676 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁵ He was named as uncle John West and was to be the executor of Henry Scarborough's undated will, which was recorded 26 May 1676.

He made a will 6 Feb 1702/03 in Accomack Co, VA. 16 To son Anthony land at Nandua - Elizabeth is wife of Anthony, Grandson John, son of Anthony, To grandduaghters Matilda, Mary Scarburgh and Jean West, daughters of my son Anthony, the Ridge land without the Neck where Anthony now lives. To son Alexander plantation at Mossongo formerly known by the name of old Brookes land. To 4 youngest daughters Catherine, Mary, Ann and Scarburgh West (all under age 16). To eldest son John and son Benony land at Deep Creek; should both die without issue Benony's part to go to Alexander's eldest son and John's part to my son Jonathan. To son Jonathan land at Chicconessick Creek. To son John land at Pungoteague. To 5 daughters Catherine, Mary, Ann, Scarburgh and Matilda land at Deep Creek. To daughter Sarah Robinson, wife of Capt. Tully Robinson, plantation at Onancock called ye Folly, containing 600 acres for life and then to her 5 children, West, Elizabeth, Scarburgh, Sarah and Susanna. Matilda was named in her mother's will 14 Jun 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ Matilda was named in her husband's will 6 Feb 1702/03 in Accomack Co, VA.² Matilda was named in her son's will 17 Jan 1708/09 in Accomack Co, VA.³ Matilda Scarburgh and Lt. Col. John West had 6 sons and 7 daughters. In 1704 Mrs. Matilda West, widow, refused to take the usual oath, being a Quaker. She must have been considered a desirable convert, because both her father and husband had been staunch adherents of the Church of England (Whitelaw, p. 653).

142. **Richard⁷ Bundick (II)** (Richard⁸)⁴ was born in Northampton Co, VA circa 1656.⁵ Richard died 1731 at 75 years of age.⁶

He married **Susanna Justice** circa 1700.⁷ Susanna was born circa 1678 in Accomack Co, VA. Susanna ⁸ was the daughter of Ralph Justice and Mary Abbott. Susanna died before 17 Sep 1729 in Accomack Co, VA, at approximately 51 years of age.⁹

Richard was living 29 Dec 1692 in Northampton Co, VA.10 Richard's will was probated 6 Jul 1731 in Accomack Co, VA.11 Richard Bundick (II)'s birth year is based on his being 21 years old when his father deeded him land in Parkers Neck in 1677. On 15 Oct 1691, Richard Bundick deeded John Barns the 300 acres his father had sold Barns in 1680, relinquishing any title he might have in the land (Acc Co Wills & C Orders, 1682-1697, p. 212). On 23 Jan 1689, Richard Bundick bought 200 acres "near the Seaboard" from Daniel Jenifer for 5600 pounds of good tobacco and cask, land to the north of "the Tann house branch" (Acc Co Wills & Deeds, 1676-1590, p. 491). On 10 Dec 1693, Richard Bundick bought another 74 acres from Daniel Jenifer, called Gargapha Savannah, for 2400 pounds of tobacco (Acc Co Wills &c. 1692-1715, part 1, p. 69). This land was near the last purchase. Richard Bundick purchased 299 acres near "Gilford Creek" for 5000 pounds of Tobacco and Casqe" from Edward Nixson, "Tanner" on 18 Jan 1701 (Acc Co Wills &c, 1692-1715, part 1, p. 394). He then owned 773 acres. The Quit Rents of Virginia in 1704 showsRichard Bundick of Acc Co, the only Bundick listed, as being taxed for 773 acres in that year (p. 14). Richard Bundick (II) sold no land. He did give away two 100-acre tracts in May of 1728, one "near Guilford Branch," to daughter Susanna Onions and her husband John Onions (Acc Co Deeds, Wills &c., 1715-1729, part 2, p. 206) and 100 acres near Gargatha to son Richard Bundick Junr (same page). Richard Bundick (II) made his will on 23 May 1731 and it was recorded on 6 July of the same year. He left son George Bundick his home plantation of 200 acres and made him his executor. He gave son Abbott (under 21) 100 acres in the woods near Gargathy. He left 73 acres on Gargathy Branch to grandson, William Bundick Pearson. Son Justis Bundick (under 21) was to inherit 100 acres near Guilford. Son George was left the remainder of Richard's land "at the head of Guilford." He named five living daughters, three of whom had married, but no wife, Richard Bundick (II) divided personal property between his children, but did not own slaves (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1729-1739, part 1, p. 153). A complete transcription of the will of Richard Bundick (II) follows - In the Name of God Amen. I, Richard Bundock of the County of Accomack being very week of body but of sound and perfect memory I ordain this to be my Last Will and Testament revoking all others. [Imprimis] I give and bequeath my soul to God that gave it and my body to the earth from whence it came and to be buried at the discretion of my Executor. [Imps] I give and bequeath to my son George Bundock my Plantation whereon I now live containing two hundred acres of land with all houses orchards and all other appurtenances thereto belonging. I give the aforesaid two hundred acres of land to him and his heirs forever. [Item] I give end bequeath to my son Abbott Bundock one hundred acres of land lying up in the woods near Gargathy and bounded on Gargathy Branch and my son Richards land till there is the quantify. I give the said one

hundred acres of land to my aforesaid sonAbbott Bundock and his heirs lawfully begotten of his body and for want of such heirs then to my son George and his heirs forever. [Item] I give to my grandson William Bundock Pearson seventy three acres of land to him and his heirs lawfully begotten of his body and for want of such heir then to my son Abbott Bundock and his heirs for ever lawfully begotten of his body and for want of such heir then to my son George Bundock and his heirs forever it being the remainder of the land I gave my son Abbott binding on Gargathy Branch and John Bakers land. [Item] I give and bequeath to my son Justis Bundock one hundred acres of land near Guilford between the land I gave John Onions and Richard Jones land from the branch till there is the sum of one hundred acres but if he dye without heir lawfully begotten of his body I give the said one hundred acres of land to my grandson John Onions and his heirs forever. [Item] I give to my son George Bundock all the remainder of my land near the head of Guilford but my will isthat my son Abbott have liberty to get timber for his own use to build upon his own land but if he dispose of any of the said timber aforesaid for any other use or profit then I barr him of his right forever. [Item] I give to my son Abbott Bundock one feather bed & bolster one rug 2 blankets &c one Duch pott one pine chest one brass candle stick one young horse two cows and Calves three ewes and lambs one sow and pigs two killable hogs three barrels of Indian corn one handmill 2 pewter dishes four plates my gun and one small table all to be paid to my son Abbott when he comes to 21 Years old. [Item] I give to my son Justis Bundock one feather bed and bolster & one rug. [Item] I give to my daughter Kezish Bundock one feather bed and bolster and one rug and one iron pott to be paid to them at twenty one years of age or at the day of marriage. [Item] I give all the remainder of my pewter to be equally divided between my three daughters Mary Evans, Tabitha Bundock and Keziah Bundock. [Item] I give to my son Justis Bundock one cow and calf two ewes and lambs and one small iron pott. [Item] I give to my son in law John Onions two ewes and lambs. [Item] I give to my three daughters Ann Abbott, Susanna Onions and Mary Evans twelve pence apiece and to my son Richard Bundock I also give twenty pence. [Item] I give to my dutiful son George Bundock all the remainder part of my estate in what kind soever both real and personal after all my legal and just debts are paid &c by him freely to be possessed and enjoyed by him and his heirs forever and 1 do further appoint my son George Bundock my whole and sole Executor of this my Last Will and Testament, and I do utterly revoke and disallow all and every other former Testaments wills and Executors by me in any ways before this time named will and bequeathed ratifying this and no other to be my Last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 23rd day of May 1731. The words lawfully begotten of his body is interlined in the second Item before assigned. Witnesses present: Thos. Evans, William Wilson and Willm Hastins. Signed Richard (RB his mark) Bundock. At a Court held for Accomack County the 6th day of July 1731 the within Last Will & Testament of Rich'd Bundock deceased was proved in open Court by the Oaths of Thomas Evans Gent & William Wilson two of the witnesses to the same & admitted to record (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1729-1739, part 1, p. 153).

Thomas was born circa 1700 in Accomack Co, VA. Thomas died by 29 Oct 1751 in Accomack Co, VA, at 51 years of age. In his will of 7 Sep 1738 William Wilson named a goddaughter Mary Evans, daughter of Capt. Thomas Evans.

Richard Bundick (III)¹² was born in Parkers Neck, Acc Co, VA circa 1705.¹³ Richard died 1766 in Accomack Co, VA, at 61 years of age.¹⁴ He married Ann Nock circa 1728.¹⁵ Ann was born circa 1708 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁶ Ann ¹⁷ was the daughter of John Nock and Mary Barnes. Ann was named in her father's will 24 Dec 1739 in Accomack Co, VA. Ann Nock's father, John Nock, named her as Ann Bundick in his will dated 24 Dec 1739 and named her husband, Richard Bundick (III) as a Executor along with his son, George Nock (Acc Co Wills, 1737-43, p. 222).

Richard was named in his grandfather's will 17 Sep 1729 in Accomack Co, VA. 18 He was shown as a grandson Richard Bundick in the will of Ralph Justice, wife Mary. Richard Bundick (III) was born in Parker's Neck, on land his father had been given in 1677 by Richard Bundick (I). On 7 May 1728, his father gave Richard Bundick (III), 100 acres near Gargatha, "part of land I bought of Colonel Jenefer" (Acc Co Deeds, Wills &c., 1715-1729, part 2, p. 206). When Richard Bundick (II), died testate in 1731, he only left son Richard 12 pence in his will, but he did mention that land he was leaving son Abbott Bundick adjoined son Richard's land. This Richard Bundick was also named in the 1728 will of his grandfather, Ralph Justis, who left him a slave (Acc Co Wills & Deeds 1729-1737, part 1, p. 47). Richard Bundick (III), lived his entire adult life on the 100 acres of

land east of Gargatha that his father gave him in 1728. At his intestate death in 1766, the land descended to his oldest son, Richard Bundick (IV), called "Piper" in local records. Note that Whitelaw, p. 1160, has this 100 acres mixed up with the 72/74 acres Richard Bundick II, left grandson WilliamBundick Pearson in 1731, apparently being unaware he had deeded this 100 acres to son Richard before he died. Whitelaw locates the land behind the present Arcadia Nursing Home, to the east of U.S. 13, and on both sides of Gargatha Landing Road. On 27 May 1766, John Bundick was named to administer the estate of Richard Bundick (Acc Co Orders, 1765-1767, p. 33). John would have been Richard's younger son and he gave his brother, Richard Bundick (Richard (IV) or "Piper"), as his security. The inventory of Richard Bundick's personal estate, valued at 18 pounds, 1 pence, 19 shillings, was returned on 26 Nov 1766. It was signed by the appraisers John Kittson, Charles Bagwell and William Nock (Acc Co Wills, 1761-1767, pp. 672/3). It was divided into five lots, one for each of his children.

vii. Abbott Bundick¹ was born in Accomack Co, VA circa 1712. Abbott died 1784 at 72 years of age.² He married three times. He married Sophia Bagwell circa 1735.³ Sophia was born circa 1715. Anthony immigrated to 1622.1 Anthony was living 16 Feb 1622/3 in James City, VA.2 He made a will 12 Oct 1651.3 Anthony's will was probated 25 May 1652.4 Anthony West came to Virginia in the "James," 1622, and in the census, 1623/4, is listed at James City, where he is living at "Mr. Treasuror's Plantation," across the river from Jamestown, 1624/5. At a court held at James City, 12 Dec 1625, Henry Menefre, merchant, testified that Mrs. Rowsley did set Anthony West free and delivered his Indenture to Capt. Sampson to carry into England to his friends. On 9 Jan 1625/6 he testified at a James City court concerning the quality of some tobacco. He is mentioned in Virginia records between 28 Feb 1627/8 and 14 Apr 1628 as having shipped 1380 pounds of tobacco to the port at Dartmouth, England. Subsequently he returned to England, and as Anthony West of Shadwell, chirurgion, he married Anne Huffe. He may be the Anthony West referred to in a York County order, 1644/5, in which a debt of tobacco, incurred by Hercules Bridges, was due and payable to Anthony West in 1644 within five days. He definitely returned with his family to Virginia by 5 Oct 1649, when Anthony West, Ann his wife, John West and Kathe West were named as headrights in a patent issued to Capt. Randall Herle, mariner, for 600 acres in Northampton County on the Great Nusewattock River, from Chingandehee Creeke Mouth unto Arokoko Creeke. His will name his wife Ann and children John and Katherine (Adventurers of Purse and Person, pp. 661-662).

Edmund Bowman (tract A92) as "marrying the esecutrix of Mrs. Ann Charlton," and she must have been Katherine (West) Scarborough. She was Bowman's 4th wife and survived him.

To grandson Edmund Bowman Cropper land called Crurch Neck binding upon Folly Branch. To grandson Nathaniel Cropper land between small beare branch and Cowpen branch. To grandaughter Elizabeth Atkins 200 acres. Land on Messongo to be sold for the good of my estate. To grandson Southy Littleton. To granddaughter Gertrude Littleton. Wife (no name) and daughter Gertrude Cropper residual legatees and Extrs. Witt: William Parker, William Bunting and William Martiall.

Edmund's will was probated 15 Mar 1691/92 in Accomack Co, VA.4

Katherine was named in her father's will 12 Oct 1651.⁵ She was named as daughter Barloe in the will of Anthony West and in the notes following the will it indicates she was Mrs. Katheryne Barlowe (the sister of John West and the aunt of John Elsey).

Katherine was named in her husband's will 22 Sep 1652 in Nandua, Acc Co, VA.⁶ She was named as wife Kathryne Barlowe and was given 1/3 of what was given by her father's will in the will of Raphaell Barlowe. The child she was going with was to get the plantation in Nandue, which I now live upon.

Ye towe [2] ewes unto my coosen [cousin] Mellinge takeing his receipt this (?) note (?) ye discharge. (?). your lovinge friend Mary Scarburge. July 22 1657. Recd by mee William Mellinge of Mr. Edward Littleton by order & (?) oof Mrs. Mary Scarburge towe [2] ere [ewe] lambs being given by the last will & testament of Mrs. Ann Littleton (decd) unto Littleton Scarburge sonne to CollenII Edm. Scarburgh & Mary his wife. August 11 1657 (From Northampton Co. Mary's will was probated 15 Dec 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.5

He was baptized 2 Oct 1617 in St. Martin's in-the-Fields, London, England.⁶ Edmund immigrated to before 1634.⁷ Col. Edmund Scarburgh was a Surveyor General of Virginia.

Edmund's estate was administered 1672 in Accomack Co, VA.8 It was on this date that Devoras Browne was named to settle his estate. There was no order of qualifications. Edmund Scarburgh. baptized 2 Oct 1617, probably accompanied his parents to Virginia. He deposed 26 Oct 1653, aged about 34, that he had lived in Virginia 22 years, but was born in London and was a trader with New Amsterdam. He was a witness in the "Accawmack" Court, March 1633/4, to a deed of sale of two wild cows by his father. In addition to the patent granted him upon the death of his father, he received also on the same date, 28 Nov 1635, 200 acres on the seaboard side in Accomack which had also been assigned previously to his father. He rose rapidly to a place of prominence in Virginia, serving as Burgess from Northampton 1643, 1645-48, 1652, 1656, 1660-62, and from Accomack 1666-70, was speaker of the House of Burgessess, 1645, Surveyor General of Virginia, 1665-70, King's Collector of guit-rents, 1663, and justice and sheriff of Northampton County. Colonel Edmund Scarburgh engaged extensively in maritime shipping and was part or sole owner of several vessels. His most important enterprise was the extraction of salt from sea water by evaporation for which he obtained a monopoly on the Eastern Shore. In his capacity as captain of militia and later as commander-in-chief of forces on the Eastern Shore, he led a number of raids against Indians. His difficulties with them led him to harsh and unjust treatment of the savages, on which and other charges he was tried and by order of the General Court, 1670, he was suspended from "all offices as well as military and civil until by his future obedience and fidelity it shall please the Right Honorable the Governor to restore him." He has been called arrogant, contentious and power hungry and had made, in 1663, an unofficial effort to annex the Maryland settlements at Annemessex and Manokin (now Dorchester and Somerset Counties, Maryland) to Accomack County by moving a boundary point thirty miles to the north. His death was noted by Governor Sir William Berkeley, 1671, and on 23 May 1671 his son Charles and his sons-in-law John West and Devorax Browne were granted letters of administration of his estate in place of Mary Scarburgh, relict of Edmund. Tabitha was living 12 Aug 1700 in Accomack Co, VA.²² She was named as Madame Tabitha Hill, the great grandmother of Edmund Custis' children Thomas Custis and Tabitha Scarburgh Custis, as was to be their advisor during their minority.

She made a will 23 Aug 1717 in Accomack Co, VA.²³ Tabitha Hill named only a great grandson Thomas Custis and his wife Ann. She left him 700 acres near the

placed called White Marsh and to his wife Ann, my wearing stays embroidered with gold, my black suit and silk clothes and black stays set with bugles with one cloath of silver pettycoat. Great grandson Thomas Custis was the residual legatee of all her estate in Virginia, England or elsewhere. Thomas Custis was the executor. Witt: John Morrogh and Elizabeth Tilney.

Tabitha's will was probated 7 Jan 1717/18 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ Tabitha Browne was named as the relict of Mr. "Devoras" Browne by George Watson in will, written 4 Nov 1674. She was aslo named to be the executrix (Acc Co Wills, 1763-76(v), p. 242).

ii. Col. Charles [10] Scarburgh (I)² was born in Accomack Co, VA 1643.³ He deposed on 31 Dec 1678 that he was aged 35. Charles died by 6 Oct 1702 in Accomack Co, VA, at 59 years of age.⁴ It was on this date that his will was probated. He married Elizabeth (3) Bennett circa 1670 in Acc or Nansemound Co, VA.⁵

Elizabeth was born circa 1642 in Nansemond Co, VA.⁶ Elizabeth ⁷ was the daughter of Gov. Richard Bennett and Ann (1) (----). Elizabeth died Jul 1719 in Accomack Co, VA, at 77 years of age.⁸ Her body was interred in Scarburgh Graves, Evans Wharf, Acc Co, VA.⁹ Elizabeth was named in her husband's will 6 Aug 1701 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ She held 4,205 acres in Accomack County in 1704.¹¹

She made a will 2 Jun 1719 in Accomack Co, VA. To son Bennett. Son Charles. Son Henry. Daughter Mary Leatherbury. Daughter Sarah Black. Daughter Tabitha Bagwell. To 3 daughters my interest in Tangier Island, to each 1/3 and not to sell except to each other. To grandson Scarburgh Drummond. To grandson Henry, son of my said son Henry Scarburgh. To grandson Charles, son of my said son Charles Scarburgh. Granddaughter Ann Parker. Granddaughter Elizabeth Bagwell. Granddaughter Edith Baily. Daughters Mary, Sarah and Tabitha residual legatees and executrices. Witt: Sacker Parker, Samuel Turner, Leah Parker and William Finney Jr.

Elizabeth's will was probated 4 Aug 1719 in Accomack Co, VA.13

Charles graduated from in Caius College, Cambridge, England 1664.¹⁴ He was a Burgess from N'hamp County, 1680-82, from Accomack, 1684, 1688, 1691-92 and was a member of the Council, 1696-1702. In 1693 he is mentioned as commander in chief of militia, justice and president of the court of Accomack County. He was one of 9 persons named in 1691 to be present for the taking their Majesties' grant of a Charter to erect a Colledge [William & Mary]. In 1683 he held 9,950 acres in Accomack County. Most of the heirs of Colonel Charles Scarburgh and his wife Elizabeth Bennett were named in a deed of 2 Oct 1721 conveying all rights to "Bennett's Adventure" to George Dashiell of Somerset County (Somerset Co, MD, Deed Bk, IK, p. 192).¹⁵

Charles was named in his mother's will 14 Jun 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.16 In

a Codicil to her will, Mary Scarburgh revoked the legacy to her son Charles on account of his neglect.

He made a will 6 Aug 1701 in Pungoteague, Acc Co, VA.1 To eldest son Bennet Scarburgh 521 acres near Kikotanck formerly called Hogneck, now Antingham; land in Jollys Neck and his one share of Benefield in Pocomoke containing 3,000 acres and his share of 2,500 acres in Wickocomo in Maryland, to be equally divided between him and his sister Ann Parker. To son Charles Scarburgh planatation at Great Matomkin where he now lives containing by patent 2,100 acres. To son Henry Scarburgh plantation where I now live at Pungoteague after the death of my wife and my Island called Scarburgh Winter Island in the mouth of Pungoteague. To daughter Ann, wife of George Parker of Onancock, Gent: her share of 3,000 acres at Pocomoke called Benefield and of 2,500 acres at Wickomoco, Maryland, called Bennet's Adventure and 1/2 of 2,000 acres at Pocomoke, in Virginia, to be divided between her and her brother Bennet Scarburgh. To daughter Mary Scarburgh land at Pungoteagure called Yeo's Neck, now Bradfield, purchased of Justinian Yeo. To daughter Sarah 2,000 acres on the south side of White Marsh. To daughter Tabitha Scarburgh land near the Court House, land at Anancock, called the Town, land in Burton's Branch. To wife Elizabeth lot at Anancock Town, Tangier Island, at Bundicks and Muddy Creek and 3,000 acres called Hogquarter in Maryland and all other land not already by me given, also my plantation and land and Winter Island for life. Wife residual legatee and executrix. Witt: John West, minor, John Lilliston, Edmond Scarburgh and John Morragh.

 - iv. Littleton [12] Scarburgh² was born in Accomack Co, VA after 1645/6.³ Littleton died 1672 at 25 years of age.⁴ Littleton was living 1656.⁵ Littleton Scarburgh was named as a godson of Ann (Southy) Littleton, widow of Colonel Nathaniel Littleton, in her will of 1656. She left him 10 ewe sheep (N'hamp Co Deeds, Wills, etc., 1655-1657, f. 22). He was the son of Colonel Edmund Scarburgh and Mary his wife (Ibid, f.24). He died young, unmarried and without issue.
 - v. Col. Edmund [11] Scarburgh (III)⁶ was born in Accomack Co, VA 1647-1649.⁷ Edmund died by 5 Jan 1711/12 in Accomack Co, VA, at 64 years of age.⁸ It was on this date that his will was probated. He married twice.

He married Ursula Whittington circa 1670 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ Ursula was born circa 1650 in England.¹⁰ Ursula ¹¹ was the daughter of Capt. William Whittington and Elizabeth (----). Ursula died circa 1681.¹² Ursula was named in her father's will 4 May 1659 in Northampton Co, VA.¹³ She was shown as my daughter Urselie Whittington and given the 300 acres (exepted as aforsaid out of my Virginia lands) in the will of Capt. William Whittington, who was intending to take a voyage to Holland.

Ursula immigrated to circa 1672.14 He married Elizabeth Wainhouse circa

1681.¹ Elizabeth was born circa 1650 in Accomack Co, VA.² Elizabeth died 29 Oct 1720 at 70 years of age.³ Elizabeth was named in her husband's will 21 May 1711 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ She was named as wife Elizabeth and given 1/2 of my plantation and Neck of land for life and then to my 3 sons, in the will of Col. Edmund Scarburgh.

Elizabeth was named in her daughter's will 30 Nov 1713 in Accomack Co, VA.⁵ She was named only as 'my mother' in Tabitha Bell's will.

Edmund was named in his mother's will 14 Jun 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.⁶ He was the Accomack County Surveyor.

He made a will 21 May 1711 in Accomack Co, VA.7 To daughter Ursley 1 shilling, she having had her part of my estate. To daughter Hannah the same. To daughter Elizabeth the same. To daughter Mary the same. To daughter Tabitha the same. To daughter Matilda the same. To daughter Edmund Memoria the same. To daughter Sarah (under age 14). Eldest son Edmund Scarburgh 832 acres out of my Neck of 2,000 acres surveyed for him by me. To second son Edmund Scarburgh 604 acres out of my 2,000 acres surveyed for him by me. To son Michell 500 acres out of my 2,000 acres surveyed for him by me. To wife Elizabeth 1/2 of my plantation and Neck of land for life and then to my three sons. Wife executrix. Witt: James Drummond, Charlton Waltham, Morris Shepheard, Edmund Bayly, John Hall and Jacob Duey. In 1649 a patent was given to Edmund Scarburgh, Jr. for 2,000 acres. The next year the Indian rights were bought from Okiawampe, "great Kinge of the Easterne Shore." In that deed the land was called Occhannocke; today it is known as Scarburgh's Neck. The patentee was the second son of Colonel Edmund, who took out patents in the names of each of his children. In 1652 a patent was given to Littleton Scarburgh for 1,000 acres, which was reissued in 1664. Littleton was the youngest son of Colonel Edmund. In 1653 it seemed advisable for the colonel to leave the Shore for a while, so in this year he leased the whole 3,000 acres to William Bunton of Boston "for and dureinge the Tearme of ffourteene yeares, att which tyme my sonne Edmund will come to age." No record was noted of a cancellation of the lease, but shortly afterwards the colonel was again in residence here, where he continued until his death in 1671. The son Littleton had died under age and without issue, and the eldest son, Charles Scarburgh, claimed the land. The suit went on up to the General court which in 1672 ruled as follows: Mr. Edmond Scarburgh producing a patent granted.....(Whitelaw, pp. 618-619 - tract A17). (SOME OF THESE ITEMS SEEMS TO BE ABOUT HIS FATHER) Although no record of his birth has been found, the above statements imply that he was born in 1646. This is based on the statement that in 1653 his father leased land previously patented to his son for fourteen years, at which time he would come to age. Assuming come to age meant 21 years. "Capt. Edmund Scarburgh, second son of Col. Edmund Scarburgh, like his brother Charles, held high positions in Accomack County, including both civil and military offices (Va. Mag. Hist. & Biog., Vol. I., pp. 229-231.) In 1677 he was justice of Accomack and a signatory party to the historic Accomack Memorial, which was submitted to Governor Berkeley after the collapse of Bacon's Rebellion (Wise, p.

John's will was probated 5 Mar 1733/4 in Accomack Co, VA.1

173. **Mary**⁸ (Cade?) was born in England 1610-1612.² Mary died Dec 1691 in Accomack Co, VA, at 81 years of age.³ She died at the home of Anthony West on Merry Branch.

She married **Col. Edmund [3] Scarburgh (II)** circa 1639 in Accomack Co, VA.⁴ Edmund was born 1617 in St. Martin's in-the-Fields, London, England.⁵ Edmund ⁶ was the son of Capt. Edmund [1] Scarburgh (I) and Hannah Butler. Edmund died May 1671 in Hedric Cottage, Occahannock Cr, Acc Co, VA, at 53 years of age.⁷ His body was interred in Hedra Cottage, Scarborough Neck, Acc Co, VA.⁸ He was baptized 2 Oct 1617 in St. Martin's in-the-Fields, London, England.⁹ Edmund immigrated to before 1634.¹⁰ Col. Edmund Scarburgh was a Surveyor General of Virginia.

Edmund's estate was administered 1672 in Accomack Co, VA.¹¹ It was on this date that Devoras Browne was named to settle his estate. There was no order of qualifications. (See Col. Edmund [3] Scarburgh (II) for the children resulting from this marriage.)

Recd by mee William Mellinge of Mr. Edward Littleton by order & (?) oof Mrs. Mary Scarburge towe [2] ere [ewe] lambs being given by the last will & testament of Mrs. Ann Littleton (decd) unto Littleton Scarburge sonne to Collenll Edm. Scarburgh & Mary his wife. August 11 1657 (From Northampton Co. VA Deeds, Wills, etc. 1655-1657, Book VII page fol. 24 (or 214), provided by Cynthia McDaniel, 5 Oct 2007) (NOTE: Evidently Mary was a cousin of William Mellinge.)

On 20 Jul 1671 in a deposition in a case between Capt. West and Ambrose White, Mrs. Mary Scarburgh aged about 61 years declared that about two weeks ago at the house of Ambrose White, she found Capt. West, the constable, searching for lost goods. On the floor was a bag and one Holland shirt that West claimed to be his. White claimed that he had bought the cloth from West before he went to Nevis ...¹²

Daughter Matilda West and grandson Anthony West residual legatees and executors. Witt: James Alexander, Edward Marten, Tully Robinson, Richard Bally Jr. - Codicil: Revoking legacy to son Charles

Scarburgh on account of his neglect.

Mary's will was probated 15 Dec 1691 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ Thomas Teackle Upshur, a noted Eastern Shore genealogist from the late 1800's, showed her as Mary Cade. She did have a great-granddaughter named Mary Cade Wise who was born just a few years after Mary Scarburgh died.

174. **Richard⁸ Bundick (I)** was born circa 1620. Richard died 1693 in Northampton Co, VA, at 72 years of age.²

He married three times. He married **Dorothy** (-----) circa 1648 in Northampton Co, VA.³ Dorothy was born circa 1620. He married **Ruth** (-----) circa 1664.⁴ Ruth was born circa 1630. She married (-----) **Jones** circa 1650.⁵ Ruth died circa 1680. He married **Elizabeth** (-----) circa 1685.⁶ Elizabeth was born circa 1640.

Richard's will was probated 28 Feb 1692/3 in Northampton Co, VA.7 The name of Richard Bundick first appears in Eastern Shore of Virginia records on 30 Aug 1647, as his name was given with eight other headrights when John Foster patented 450 acres of land in Northampton County (N'hamp Co Deeds, Wills 1645-1651, p. 110). The land was located on the sea side, between Nassawadox and Machipongo (Whitelaw, p. 365 and map). A colonist was eligible for 50 acres of land for each person for whom he had paid transportation costs from England. These persons were called headrights, and had agreed to work for their sponsor for several years, as indentured servants, to pay back their cost of transportation. However, Richard Bundick likely paid for his own passage and assigned his right to 50 acres to John Foster. Richard Bundick made a deposition in Northampton County Court on 21 Jun 1662, in which he gave his age as 41 years "or thereabout" (N'hamp Co Order Book, 1657-1664, p. 97). This indicates he was born circa 1620 and was 27 years of age when he came to the Colony of Virginia. Richard Bundick was granted a patent to 650 acres of land on the south side of Pungoteague Creek on 21 Nov 1654 (Nugent I. p. 296), a patent that was renewed on 20 Oct 1661 (Nugent I. p. 412). He sold this 650 acres on Pungoteague Creek to Francis Moryson on 6 Sept 1672 (N'hamp Co Deeds, 1668-1680, p. 36). On 23 May 1663, Richard Bundick, planter, and wife Dorothy deeded 500 acres on the south side of Pungoteague Creek to Richard Jacob, deceased, saying this land had been purchased from Nicholas Waddelaw (Wallop) and that they had "received full and valuable satisfaction for ye afsd 500 acres" before Jacob died (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666, pp. 9/10). Witnesses to the deed were Evitt Jones and Thomas ffawkes. Richard Jacob's will, written 13 Jan 1663, recorded 2 Mar 1663, apparently left this land to a son Issac and spoke, in his will, of 350 acres he was leaving son Thomas "at Pungoteague on the western part of a main branch of said Creek whereon Richard Bundick presently lives" (N'hamp Co Deeds, Will, etc. 1657-1666, p. 140). On 12 Jul 1664, Richard Bundick was granted a patent for 1,400 acres in Accomack County, "at seaboard side beginning at land of Col Edmund Scarburgh, bounded south by Long tone (Long Love) Branch" (Nugent I, p. 524). One of his headrights was a William Wright. On 9 Oct 1672, Richard Bundick patented 600 additional acres "Being the surplus within bounds of his 1,400 acres at Arcadia" (Nugent II, p. 119). This block of about 2,000 acres is presently called Parkers Neck. It is bound south and west by Parkers Creek, the northern branch of which, called Long Love Branch or Poorhouse Branch, crosses U.S. 13 just south of Zion Church. The creek to the north was originally Arcadia Creek and on present-day maps is labeled Bundicks Creek. On 18 Dec 1666, Richard Bundick and Ruth, his wife, sold to Thomas flowkes 700 acres "of Land being the one half of a patent of ffourteen hundred acres granted to me at James City under the hand of ye Honble William Berkeley and sealed wth ye seale of ye Colony the 12 July 1664" (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666. pp. 39/40). The consideration was "8,000 pounds of tobacco & Cast, the value thereof in hand." On 14 Feb 1667, Richard Bundick and wife Ruth gave his daughter, Elizabeth Sturgis, 200 acres "next unto ye lands sold to Mr. Thomas ffowkes" (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666, p. 63). On 16 Dec 1673, Richard Bundick and Ruth sold 550 acres to John Drummond, stating this was all that could be found of his 9 Oct 1672

patent (Acc Co Wills &c., 1673-1676, p. 104). On 16 Nov 1677 Richard Bundick and wife Ruth gave his son Richard 200 acres "next to my son in Law John Sturgis - part of a 1,400 acre Patent" (Acc Co Wills & Deeds, 1676-1690, p. 69). On 18 Nov 1680, Richard Bundick and wife Ruth sold to John Barns 300 acres for "tenn thousand ffour hundred pounds of good merchantable tobacco and cask - near Creek called by the name of Arcadia" (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666, p. 236). Richard Bundick lived to be an old man for the times. He would have been about 72 when he wrote his will on 9 Dec 1692. It was recorded on 28 Feb 1693. He owned no land at this tine and was apparently living in Northampton County. He called himself "Planter" and he named five children (Richard, Elizabeth, Ann, Dorothy and Grace), each of whom was to receive 100 pounds of tobacco. His remaining estate, after debts were paid, was left to his wife Elizabeth and she was made executrix (N'hamp Co Orders & Wills, 1689-1698. p. 224). A complete transcription of the will of Richard Bundick (I) follows - In the name of God Amen, I, Rich'd Bundick Senr of the county of Northampton in Virginia, Planter, Being very sick and weak of body but thanks be to God of sound & perfect memory & being sensible of the uncertainty of life, doe make this my last & testament in manor & form following: I doe give and bequeath my body to original mother the earth desiring a christian burial at the discretion of my executrix hereafter named. And my soul to almighty God who goes is induring this mortal life hoping through the moritts(?) of my blessed Savor Jesus Christ to Jnhoritt(?) Ewnall(?) life; and as for my worldly estate that is hath pleased God to intrust me with in this Government aforesaid farr beyond my iosorts(?). [Item] I doe hereby nominate order and ordain my dear and loving wife Elizabeth Bundick my whole and sole executrix of this my last will and testament. Ordering my said executrix to pay and discharge all such debts at shall justly appear. I doe owe to any person or persons whatsoever. [Item] I doe will, give and bequeath unto my five children, Richard, Elizabeth, Ann. Dorothy, & Grace, one hundred pounds of tobacco apiece to be paid at my decease by my said executrix. [Item] I doe hereby will, give, & bequeath, all my goods, chattels household, horses, mares, cattle, or whatsoever belonging to me the said Richard Bundick Senr within doors or without, or within and part or place or in the possession of any person or persons whatsoever, within the Government aforesaidbut my dear & loving wife Elizabeth Bundick aforesaid being my Executrix aforesaid and I doe freely give & leave it at her dispatch(?) paying those legacies on the other side noncondtd(?) if demanded. And I doe own and acknowledge this to be my last will and testament. I inyingo(?) & forbid, disannulling any other by me made or spoken, and this only to be accounted my last will & c. In witness whosoever I had horbuh(?) set my hand and affixed my seal this twenty ninth day of December 1692. Signed, sealed and delivered in presence of Mich: Underhill, the mark of Edwd: E.G: Gunter, and the mark of George Green. Signed by the mark and seal of the said Rich: Bundick. The 28th day of February Dorm 1692: The within & above witnesses on the Last Will and Testament of Richard Bundick Senr was proved in open Court by the Corporall Oaths of Michael Underhill, Edward Gunter, & George Green; & allowed of in an authorlick(?) probate & ordered to be recorded (N'hamp Co Orders, Wills, 1689-1698, p. 224).

It appears likely she was a widow and owned property when she married Richard Bundick, Dorothy Bundick died between 23 May 1663, when she cosigned a deed with her husband (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666, p. 10), and 16 Nov 1665, when Ruth was "ye wife of Richard Bundick" (Acc Co Deeds & Wills, 1663-1666, p. 103).

Temperance Mason, wife of Robert Mason, who were the parents of Amy & Elizabeth, in the will of Amy Fowkes.

Temperance was named in her brother's will 23 Jul 1698 in Accomack Co, VA.¹ She was shown as my sister Hope in the will of William Anderson. She was also shown as Temperance Hope, wife of George Hope, who were the parents of nephew William Hope.

Robert bought land 1674 in Accomack Co, VA.² In 1674 Charles & Elizabeth Ratcliff sold 1,200 acres of tract A150 (which is on the north side of Messongo Creek, where Marsh Market is today) to Robert Mason and the land became divided into two 600-acre parts.

Robert sold land 1676 in Accomack Co, VA.³ In 1676 Robert and Temperance Mason sold to Henry Brookes, who in 1687 assigned to Colonel John West with the understanding that West would maintain Brookes and his wife Jane during their lives.

He married **Elizabeth (-----)** Oct 1709.⁵ George died by 7 Aug 1722 at 72 years of age.⁶ George was named as an heir 23 Jul 1698 in Accomack Co, VA.⁷ He was shown as George Hope, husband of Temperance Hope, who were the parents of nephew William Hope, in the will of William Anderson.

Temperance was named as an heir 10 Sep 1673 in Accomack Co, VA.⁹ She was shown as Temperance Mason, wife of Robert & mother of Amy Mason in the will of Thomas Fowkes, who was her mother Amey's fourth husband.

Temperance was named in her mother's will 20 Aug 1678 in Accomack Co, VA.¹⁰ She was shown as Temperance Mason, wife of Robert Mason, who were the parents of Amy & Elizabeth, in the will of Amy Fowkes.
